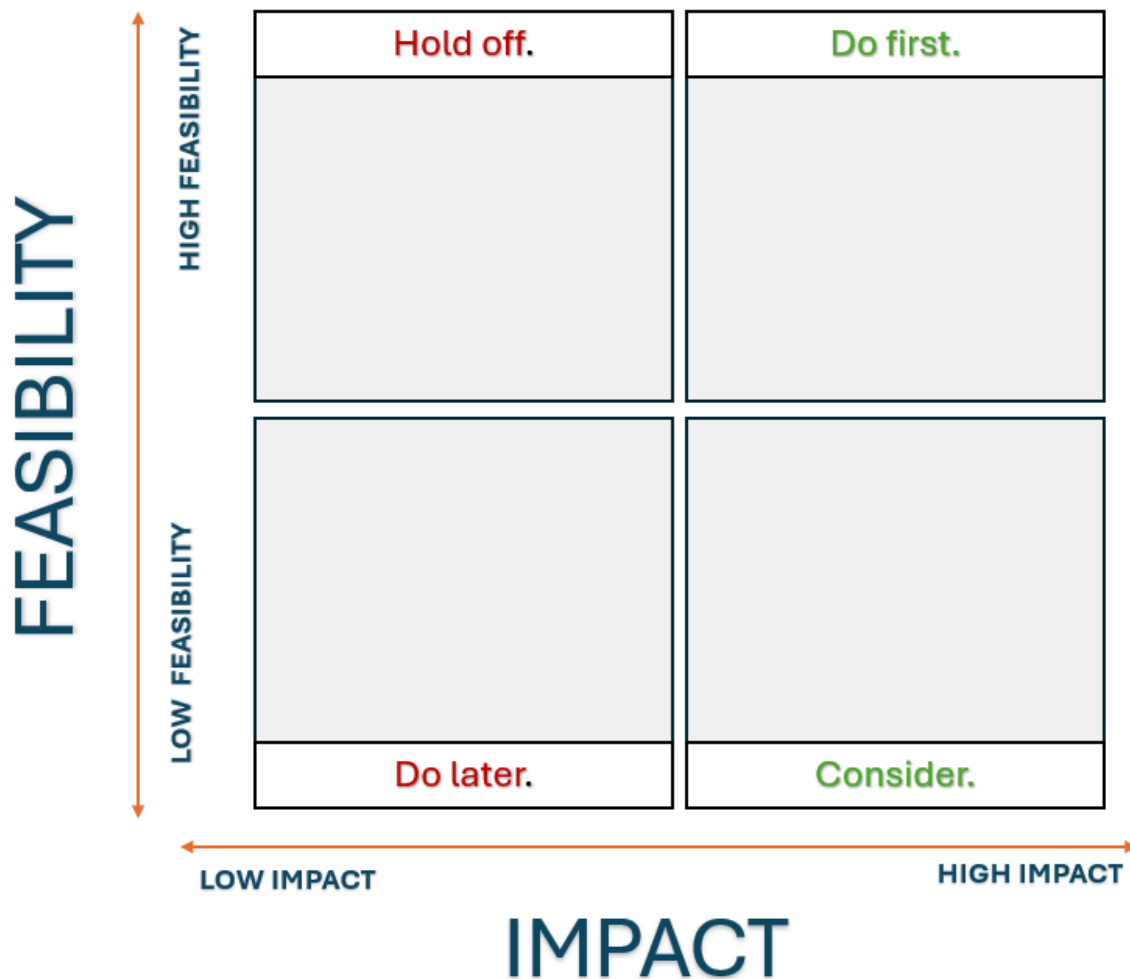


Behavioral Health Talent Council Prioritization Framework

When prioritizing recommendations, it will be helpful to focus on what is:

Most Feasible – This includes what recommendations have lowest barriers for implementation, are affordable, and can be implemented within a specific timeframe

Most Impactful – What recommendations have the greatest impact and for whom?

Key Definitions	
Feasibility	<p>The degree to which a recommendation is implementable.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Having necessary resources or pathway to resources • Expanding an existing effort or launching something new • Political feasibility • The degree to which an idea has broad community support • Having a solution ready within a specific timeframe that aligns with the Council's timeline • Low barrier
Impact	<p>The degree to which a recommendation will have the desired impact.</p> <p><i>For all Subcommittees</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Data Driven / Prior demonstrated success in achieving the desired outcome • The likelihood that the solution will provide the workforce to serve the Medicaid population <p><i>Subcommittee Specific Criteria:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The likelihood that our community's most vulnerable members will connect to education and career pathways • Streamlining education to career and/or credential attainment pathways • Expand acceleration strategies and increase timely access to credentials/career

Other Criteria to Consider

Timeline for Implementation – Can the recommendation be advanced in the short-term, mid-term, or long-term; and how long will it take to see the impact?

Resources Required – What resources (staffing, legislative, funding, etc.) will be required to advance the recommendation?
