
Behavioral Health Talent Council Prioritization Framework

When prioritizing recommendations, it will be helpful to focus on what is:

Most Feasible – This includes what recommendations have lowest barriers for implementation, are affordable, and can be implemented within a specific timeframe

Most Impactful – What recommendations have the greatest impact and for whom?

Key Definitions	
Feasibility	The degree to which a recommendation is implementable. Having necessary resources or pathway to resources Expanding an existing effort or launching something new Political feasibility The degree to which an idea has broad community support Having a solution ready within a specific timeframe that aligns with the Council's timeline Low barrier
Impact	The degree to which a recommendation will have the desired impact. For all Subcommittees Data Driven / Prior demonstrated success in achieving the desired outcome The likelihood that the solution will provide the workforce to serve the Medicaid population Subcommittee Specific Criteria: The likelihood that our community's most vulnerable members will connect to education and career pathways Streamlining education to career and/or credential attainment pathways Expand acceleration strategies and increase timely access to credentials/career

Other Criteria to Consider

Timeline for Implementation – Can the recommendation be advanced in the short-term, mid-term, or long-term; and how long will it take to see the impact?

Resources Required – What resources (staffing, legislative, funding, etc.) will be required to advance the recommendation?
