Guest Speakers from Agencies (Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife) Sara Reif	 Shared that the agency is seeing staff reductions Agency is tracking items related to federal permits Concern Federal E.O.'s circumventing NEPA and Endangered Species Act Spotted owl and salmon can potentially be impacted. Programs in ODFW will be impacted with 40% budget reductions/cuts Research and Development projects also impacted Q. Alai: Intervention. Where is the intervention from our position? How can we engage? A. Sarah Reif: There is a lot to track. Where to be most effective is in the Federal Registry space for public comment. Organizations may want to comment there. There is a concern that E.O.'s may say no need for public processes or comment. Q. Jill F.: Salmon and Tribes. Tribes in Oregon, what are they focused on? 	

A. Sarah Reif: Don't know how to answer that at this time. Although ODFW and vice versa are flagging issues for one-another.

Q. Lithium: What is the time line?

A. Karin shared an Oregonian article that addressed the question on lithium. The impacted area would be SE Oregon. There is a state process for lithium. As for timeline, would need to look more into that.

A. Sarah Reif; Not sure. Maybe There is a ton of activity and moves being made. ODFW is tracking now.

A. Karin: Oregon may well not go it alone on the legal process.

Oregon Department of Forestry

(ODF): John Tokarcyk (JT) Danny Norlander (DN) JT: The challenges have been the breadth of the Federal EO's and how they are manifesting.

- EO on Timber is a concern and notable changes
 - NW Forest Plan Amendments
 - Disruption of funding and staffing changes (there is a lot of uncertainty)
- On the staffing side liaisons for Region Six resigned and took their buy-out
- Expecting 25% in reduction in Forest Service land staff
- Changes in funding has obligated changes in work for positions (staff taking on more due to impacts)
- Wildfire uncertainty is concerning
- Research analyst of Forest Health potential to not complete study that has been a 20 year longitudinal study.

DN: Fire side reductions in staffing. Concerning

- Interactions with FEMA is now more complex during fire season
- NRCS- EO's lessen impact and program implementation
- Have not heard payments have been rejected as of yet
- Next two or three years there may be more of an impact than this year

JT: Profound and catastrophic in terms of uncertainty in funding.

DN: Now trying to categorize with EJC what statutes are mostly

	impacted Q. Clara Soh: Public comments. Can you share action alerts?	
	A: Yes. That can be shared. (It was noted that individuals can provide public comment quicker than if they wanted to act as a committee. Recommendation was to provide comment as individuals and clearly state that.)
