Update on the water justice funding restored in the short session.	 Comment/Question: Groundwater Testing and Farming Practices: 	
in the short session.	 There was groundwater testing for nitrates in water due to farming practices in Malheur County 15 years ago. 	
	 OHSU (Oregon Health & Science University) suggested that changing farming practices wouldn't be helpful. 	
	 Over the past decade, improvements have been observed.

	The retired superintendent is asked to discuss this	

issue in Umatilla. Will funding be used for research in Umatilla to drive practice changes. **Answer: Capacity Building:** Aim is to focus on capacity building, community service, and education. Numerous grant programs in the state address these aspects in northeast Oregon. **Concerns about Water Quality:** Water quality issues in agricultural areas, considering both farming practices and climate change. Small grants alone are insufficient; a comprehensive team approach is needed. Looking ahead to 2025, learning from different hotspots (e.g., well issues, drought, climate change) is crucial. **Monsanto Settlement:** The Monsanto settlement involves \$700 million for pollution caused by Monsanto Company. Legislation has been passed to create a council with three lanes of distribution: general, tribes, and disadvantaged communities. The state has a significant resource, but specific parameters are yet to be defined. Priorities should align with new opportunities arising from this settlement. **Community Awardees and Water Projects:** The first nine awardees in May are community organizations through the University of Oregon's water education program. These diverse groups, previously unfunded, will work on culturally specific water practices. A significant \$1 million ask has been made. **Community Requests and Webinar on Water** Law: Community members seek specific projects, such as those costing around \$100,000. A webinar on water law is being considered, with some individuals willing to participate. EEC membership update **Housekeeping and Committee Applications:** An invitation has been sent out for committee members to reapply.

Co-chairs will serve in RJC committee meetings. If you haven't applied yet, please do so. Governor approval is required for all members. This is the last call for applications. Reapplication details are at the bottom of the agenda. Susana and I can assist with the process. Susana has created a helpful cheat sheet for navigating Workday. Start a new profile if needed and understand the distinction between external and internal applications. New member recruitment will take place in May. Emphasis on racial and geographic diversity. Sometimes the same individuals serve on different committees. The governor recommends a working committee size of 8-15 people. Organizational Representation on the Committee: Organizations can have more than one representative on the committee. Diversity is encouraged, and it's not solely about organizational representation. o The governor seeks new volunteers, especially those not currently serving in other areas. Javier's Input on Onboarding and Term Length: Proper onboarding is crucial, and committee terms last two years. Recruitment isn't limited to a specific time of year; the "sweet spot" remains uncertain. **Reaching Out for Recommendations:** Everyone can be a recruiter. Utilize your experience and let us know how we can assist. We'll compile a list of potential candidates. Evaluating previous and Renters' Rights and Water Quality: **Request for Email** exploring new priorities **Notifications:** Three students conducted research on renters facing

issues when water is not potable.

- Precedents from three other states have passed legislation related to this.
- Emergency response during ice storms has been crucial.
- Proper information dissemination, especially linguistically and culturally specific, is essential.
- Radios are a useful communication tool during emergencies.

Access to Joanna and State Resiliency Officers:

- Joanna, a state resiliency officer, shared valuable information after the ice storms.
- Co-chairs can bring this information back to the committee.
- Karin has facilitated connections with agencies, leading to fruitful collaborations.
- Having directors involved enhances the committee's effectiveness.

• Policy, Priorities, and Budget:

- The governor is keen on agencies' community service and implementation.
- Identifying holes or blind spots is crucial for an effective response.
- Implementation matters, even beyond legislative policy.
- Last fall, discussions began about federal funds for environmental initiatives.
- Solar for All received \$99 million for lowincome solar efforts.
- The state's equity advisor group and partnerships with communities of color play a vital role.
- Tic Tac, a new initiative, can be explored further.

Governor's Water Policy Scope:

- The governor's office aims to shape water policy for the next session.
- Policy changes, not just budget considerations, are essential for water security goals.

An email notification system for sessions and budget updates would be helpful.
