Review draft County Education and Training Fact Sheets

Summary:

In support of the Commission's strategic focus on "Reporting to Steer Progress," the Office of Research and Data has developed fact sheets summarizing local levels of postsecondary education and training. These sheets are designed to bring state-level efforts to expand postsecondary education and training to the local level. The Office is creating a sheet for each of Oregon's 36 counties, describing the workforce opportunities, educational attainment, and Commission work occurring in each county. We plan to use these fact sheets to inform local civic, education, and business leaders and to engage them in mechanisms to expand education and training in their communities.

We are now at a point in the sheets' development to invite Commissioners' feedback. We have provided two examples of this initial draft below, one for Lincoln County and one for Marion County. Each is a single-page, two-sided document. The front side has information that describes why postsecondary education and training matter; current levels of enrollment, completion, and attainment; and relevant socio-economic characteristics in the county. The back side describes mechanisms to increase postsecondary education and training related to college readiness, affordability, and workforce training. The fact sheets draw on many sources of information, including the Oregon Employment Department, the Oregon Department of Education, the U.S. Census Bureau, Oregon State University, and the student data we collect and analyze in the HECC agency.

Following today's meeting, we will continue to invite feedback from our institutional and workforce partners, as well as from education, business, and government stakeholders. The fact sheets will continue to undergo refinements during this time, including adjusting content and graphics in response to feedback and updated materials (e.g., the new adult attainment goal, the state longitudinal data system). We plan annual publication with updated data each year.






Why Education and Training Matter












