2020 Institutional Snapshots

**Summary:**

To support the Commission's reporting goal, the Office of Research and Data has updated the higher education snapshots we first published in 2018. This is the third annual set of snapshots, which provide uniform reporting on enrollment, affordability, and completion for the State and each public institution. The snapshots are meant for a wide audience, including the Commission, our institutional partners, members of the public (including students, families, and the media), the Legislature and other government entities, and policy makers in other settings. Their focus on three primary aspects of postsecondary education, with breakouts by race/ethnicity and first-generation status, provide empirical descriptions of the State, the institutions, and the students we serve.

The 2020 snapshots describe many aspects of the learners at our community colleges and public universities. Some examples include:

- Over half of all learners at the community colleges and one-quarter of Oregon undergraduates at the public universities are over age 25.
- Among students who filed for a grant or scholarship, almost half (44%) were unable to meet the published cost of attendance with the resources of expected family contribution, federal and state grants, and an estimate of student earnings. By race/ethnicity, Asian American students face the largest affordability gap, with 54% unable to meet the published cost of attendance.
- Completion rates continue to rise. At the community colleges, 48% of credential-seeking students earned an associate degree or career certificate or transferred to a four-year institution nationwide within four years. At the public universities, 66% of first-time, full-time Oregon freshmen earned a bachelor's degree within six years. However, these rates show wide disparities by race/ethnicity and other indicators of equity. At the colleges, only 36% of Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander learners and only 38% of Black/African American learners earned an award or transferred within four years, compared with 51% of white learners. At the universities, 51% of Black/African American freshmen and 55% of Native American/Alaska Native freshmen earned a bachelor's degree within six years, compared to 67% of white freshmen.

These and many other measures can be found in this year's snapshots and in each of the previous two years. Included here are the most recent set of snapshots: for the state as a whole, the university sector, the community college sector, and each of the 24 public institutions. They are also published on the HECC website.
