Additional clarification:

For letter (a) – 34 total reports were received. 7 reports are categorized as "other" because they would not fit criteria for above definitions but were initially reported as sexual misconduct – examples include: watching someone sleep; and general concerns or rumors of sexual misconduct by a student; and 1 report is categorized as "retaliation".

For letter (e) – this was a retaliation complaint involving employees.

For letter (i) – A total of 299 students either transferred, withdrew, or took a leave of absence in the 2024-25 academic year. *Note: other students may have left the institution without notice*. Based on available known information, 7 students who were named either a Complainant or Respondent in a sexual misconduct report or formal complaint process left the institution. However, the Title IX Office cannot definitively state that any student left the institution for this specific reason.

For letter (j) – 29 refers to the number of students or employees who were either unresponsive to outreach, or requested supportive measures only, or requested no further action. Of the 34 total reports received, 5 formal complaints were filed and resolved or dismissed.
