Topic	Update from the Secretary's Office
Update from the Secretary's Office, Deputy Secretary of State, Michael Kaplan	The Chair introduced Michael Kaplan, Deputy Secretary of State who shared the priorities for the Secretary leadership during this term.
Topic	Approval of Minutes
Approval of January 9, 2025 Minutes	The Chair confirmed a quorum of members was present. No amendments to the minutes were requested. Topic	SoS Elections Division Staff Report
SoS Elections Division	Kelly Mills provided a report from the Elections Office. In preparing for the 2025 Legislative Session, she offered an overview of a SoS Policy Option Package to permanently fund the Policy Analyst 3 position, reclassify the Administrative Analyst 2 position, and incorporate eligibility for TAC members who are public employees to receive SoS Volunteer Stipends.
Staff Report Legislative Session 2025 and Impact of SB 1533	Supporting data included a comparison of the 2021 Legislative Fiscal Estimates for HB3021 with actual 2022- 2024 numbers, including the number of languages, Council members appointed, county ballot measures, annual county information, State Voters' Pamphlet number of words, and translations submitted by candidates and argument filers. The reported impacts of SB 1533 (2024) include the expansion of the list of languages by 6 in 2025, an increase in the number of Council members, and an increase in the total number of published, translated Voters' Pamphlets.
Topic	Engagement Survey Results
Overview of 2024 Engagement Survey Results	Melissa Maebori provided an overview of the engagement survey results. Twenty (20) people responded to the survey. New Members: Found training resources and onboarding useful and they feel confident in providing translation reviews. Additional resource ideas include mentorship, group discussions, samples of reviewer's work, help with Workday, and additional glossaries. All Members: Are not confident that their community members are aware of the existence of translated Voters' Pamphlets on the SoS webpages. They rated the amount of materials assigned to them for reviews to be reasonable. The top 3 personal benefits of participation in the Council are service to their community, connections with peers, and linguistic knowledge.

Topic	Guest Speakers: Multnomah County Voter Education and Outreach Team
Guest Speakers: Scotty Sherington & Iván Garcia	Scotty Sherington and Iván García joined the meeting to present their outreach work in the Multnomah County Voter Education Outreach (VEO) program that was established in 2015.

	Their presentation touched on how they built the program, an analysis of their V.O.T.E. Map, a typical day in the life of working for the program, and their key initiatives. Topic	Breakout Rooms
15-minute breakout rooms to reflect on Multnomah County's presentation	All attendees spent 15 minutes in small groups to reflect on the presentation from Multnomah County VEO Program. The questions for discussion were "What inspired you by the presentation?" and "What would you like election officials to know about engaging with your community?" The group came back after 15 minutes to share reflections with the whole group. Detailed follow-up comments and questions will be provided to Multnomah County staff. A summary of comments included: Multnomah County's outreach is inspiring; there are different ways to effectively reach and engage various communities; ensuring our communities' voters are informed and engaged can be accomplished through activities such as voter guide gatherings; closing the gap through information in one's primary language is critical; the Multnomah demographic map was eye-opening; having budgets for outreach teams on this work is ideal, but not practical for all counties; outreach work must build trust; additional forms of media are helpful vs. voter education tools only available in print.
