Explain how your proposed project addresses a need and supports TGM objectives

The City of Rainier is a distressed community that is in the midst of a transition towards a more vibrant and diverse economic future. However, its current Transportation System Plan was adopted in 1997, over 25 years ago. Much has changed in the community since then. An updated plan will better enable the city to focus on creating greater opportunities for multimodal transportation while still maintaining the ability of its businesses to bring products to market. The long-planned Riverfront Trail project was completed in 2022, which connects the downtown business district with the city park and allows pedestrians and bicyclists to better access those areas. The City is also exploring options aimed at expanding the variety of available housing. This creates an opportunity to develop those as walkable communities. In order to achieve these goals, the City needs to have an updated TSP that reflects modern realities, which have changed considerably since 1997.

Criterion 2: Proposed project is timely and urgent (up to 25 points)

The application demonstrates timeliness and urgency. The project is needed now to:

- address pressing local transportation and land use issues
- make amendments to local plans or regulations necessitated by changes in federal regulations, state requirements or regional plans
- make amendments to local plans or regulations necessitated by changes that were not anticipated in previous plans, including growth or lack of growth, changes in land-use patterns or changes in available funding
- build on, complement or take a necessary step toward completing or implementing other high priority community initiatives, including Governor's Regional Solutions Team priority
- resolve transportation or land use-related issues affecting the project readiness of local, regional or state transportation projects for which funding is expected to be obligated within the near future

Explain how your proposed project is timely and urgent

The City has been actively planning its next phases of residential, commercial and industrial development. In the process, it has become obvious that the current TSP is no longer meeting the City's needs. There have been numerous significant policy changes at the state level throughout the 25 years since the City's TSP was adopted. There is more of an emphasis on walkability and multimodal transportation. The City could use an updated TSP with those kinds of consideration to create neighborhoods and other areas with a greater sense of livability than has historically been the case. Additionally, the City has recently updated its Park Master Plan, with the aim of creating smaller parks in residential areas throughout town. There are also preliminary plans to create a series of walking trails. The City also recently acquired a piece of property just beyond its Urban Growth Boundary that can be used as part of a future trail system. An updated TSP is needed to put all these elements together so the City and its residents can better plan for the future.

Task 1. Collect and review existing plans. Examine current policy direction. Review neighborhood areas using GIS and other mapping data. Present to Planning Commission for direction. This should take around two months and cost around \$25,000 for a consultant.

Task 2. Conduct neighborhood and public outreach. \$15,000 consultant

Task 3. Prepare detailed identification of the transportation system needs for each of the neighborhood areas focusing on vehicular, bike, pedestrian, disabled access elements, amenities, recreation and linkages to other neighborhoods and services. Analyze the conditions of existing infrastructure. 75 days \$40,000 consultant

Task 4. Prepare detailed updated mapping of city streets, sidewalks and other transportation elements. Present the results of Task 2 and 4 to Planning Commission. 45 days \$20,000 consultant

Task 5. Prepare Capital Improvement Program and Financial Element and Phasing Plan based on Planning Commission direction. Include funding options for CIP, examine public and private options for funding resources. Include estimated costs and timeline for implementation. Conduct neighborhood outreach. 30 days \$25,000 consultant

Task 6. Prepare implementation measures, plan and regulatory amendments. Conduct neighborhood outreach. 30 days \$10,000 consultant

Task 7. Prepare draft plan. Conduct neighborhood outreach. Present to public at open house. 60 days \$15,000 consultant

Task 8. Present Plan to Planning Commission and City Council for adoption. 45 days \$10,000 consultant

How will the project approach lead to a successful project?

The technical work will be completed by the Consultant. The City will ensure that the input gathered during the neighborhood outreach is incorporated into the Plan. The City will conduct outreach through traditional and modern means, including its underserved senior population. The City will schedule meetings, review deliverables and maintain and update a webpage devoted to the project.

The Plan will be prepared for consideration of adoption before both the Planning Commission and the City Council in Task 8 of the project.


The City's current TSP is from the late 1990s and is very much outdated. An updated TSP will go a long way towards helping the City plan for its current and future transportation needs.
