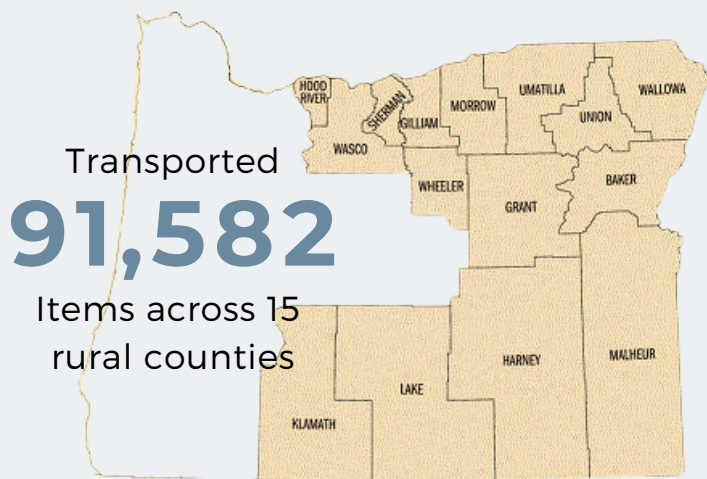


VIBRANT LIBRARY SERVICES FOR OREGONIANS

How Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) federal funds have enhanced library services in Oregon.

IMPROVING ACCESS TO INFORMATION

The State Library subsidized the Sage Courier, which transports materials between 77 libraries in Eastern Oregon.



The State Library hosted **cohorts for 69 library staff** to build programs and services to better serve their communities. Projects included improved Spanish-language collections, book clubs for new audiences, and public computers made accessible to those with disabilities.

9 small and rural public libraries received grants to enhance connectivity in their communities.

7 libraries implemented a digital literacy tool to help individuals acquire essential computer and internet skills.

19 public libraries received grants to hire teen interns who developed valuable work skills while contributing to library projects, such as creating new teen programs and engaging in outreach efforts.

The State Library partnered with the Oregon Association of School Libraries to support the Oregon School Library Information System (OSLIS), a platform that provides K-12 students and educators statewide with essential research tools and information.
