ONE LIBRARY IMPROVED SERVICES FOR IMMIGRANT AND REFUGEE POPULATIONS IN THEIR COMMUNITY.

The State Library hosted **cohorts for 69 library staff** to build programs and services to better serve their communities. Projects included improved Spanish-language collections, book clubs for new audiences, and public computers made accessible to those with disabilities.

BRIDGING THE DIGITAL DIVIDE

The **Oregon Historical Society** digitized and translated the Yasui Family Papers, offering valuable insights into the early 20th century Japanese American experience in Oregon. These materials are now widely accessible online.

Multnomah County Library and **Portland Community College** implemented a digital literacy tool to help individuals acquire essential computer and internet skills for daily life, employment, and education.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS, YOUTH, AND LIFELONG LEARNERS

Cornelius Public Library established a STEM lab designed to foster hands-on learning in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

Oregon Health & Sciences University Library partnered with the Northwest Narrative Medicine Collaborative to expand a digital library that features images and stories to be used in healthcare training and community workshops.
