BRIDGING THE DIGITAL DIVIDE


Libraries in Coquille, Newport, North Bend, Reedsport, and Yoncalla received grants to enhance connectivity in their communities. Upgrades included new public computers, mobile hotspots, and private spaces for virtual appointments, such as legal consultations, medical appointments, and job interviews.

Libraries in North Bend, Oakland, Reedsport, and Sutherlin hired teen interns who developed valuable work skills while contributing to library projects, such as creating new teen programs and engaging in outreach.

Coquille Public Library developed a collection of Social Emotional Learning (SEL) kits designed to foster emotional growth in young children and students.
