
Halloween Haunts for Fall!

Wake the Bones by Elizabeth Kilcoyne. DB110552. When nineteen-year-old Laurel moves back to her uncle's tobacco farm, she encounters a monster and her mother's ghost! Fantasy. For senior high and older readers.


Does your school participate in Oregon Battle of the Books? If so, we have most of the books on the

Here are some of the books on this year's list:

OBOB Picks Grades 3-5

Rez Dogs by Joseph Bruchac.

DB103860. A novel in verse. Malian, a



Wabanaki girl, was visiting her grandparents on the reservation when the COVID-19 pandemic started, and all travel shuts down. Away from her parents and her school in Boston,

Malian befriends a local dog. Native American fiction. For grades 3-6.

E. Frankweiler by E. L. Konigsburg BR009549. DB022914. Newbery Award. Claudia, feeling misunderstood at home, takes her younger brother and runs away to New York City where she sets up house in the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Humor. For grades 4-6.

The Trouble with Chickens by Doreen

Cronin. DB073264. J.J. Tully spent seven years as a rescue dog before retiring to the country. One day he is lured into a trap by a mutt named Vince, who wears a cone around his head



and has kidnapped two of the chicken Millicent's babies. Animal Fiction. For grades 2-4.

The Lion of Mars by Jennifer L. Holm. DB102242. Bell has spent all 11 years of his life on Mars. When a virus breaks out in their colony and the grown-ups all fall ill, Bell and the other children are the only ones who can help to uncover the truth and possibly unite an entire planet. Science Fiction. For grades 3-6.

The Midnight Children by Dan Gemeinhart. DB110084. When lonely


Ravani Foster discovers his new friend Virginia and her six mysterious runaway companions are in danger, he must fight to keep them safe, or lose the only person who has ever understood him. Adventure. For grades 5-8.



OBOB Picks Grades 6-8

The Blackbird Girls by Anne Blankman. DB099217. One morning, neighbors Valentina and Oksana wake up to an angry red sky. A reactor at the nuclear power plant where their fathers work, Chernobyl, has exploded. The two girls, who've always been enemies, find themselves fleeing together. Historical Fiction. For grades 4-7.

The Benefits of Being an Octopus by Ann Braden. DB093902. While her mom




struggles to make ends meet, Zoey focuses on caring for three younger siblings and avoids being noticed, until her fascination with octopuses gets her on the debate team. Soon she begins to speak out

and see things in a new way. School Fiction. For grades 5-8.

The Hobbit by J. R. R. Tolkien BR011595. DB048978. The wandering wizard Gandalf recruits Bilbo Baggins, a Hobbit, to be the fourteenth member of an expedition. Hobbits prefer comfort to adventures, but Bilbo joins the quest and encounters many perils, including a dragon. Fantasy. For grades 5-8.

Focused by Alyson Gerber. DB095432.





OBOB Picks Grades 9-12

Gone to the Woods: Surviving a Lost Childhood by Gary Paulsen.

DB106044. Memoir of the award-winning author of Hatchet (DB 30535), Paulsen's survival stories reflect the experiences of his turbulent childhood. Paulsen recounts these significant events in his life in five sections: the



farm, the river, the ship, thirteen, and soldier. Biography. For grades 6-9.

House of Hollow by Krystal Sutherland. DB102984. Something happened to Iris Hollow and her two older sisters, Grey and Vivi, when they were children that they can't remember and that left them with half-moon scars. When Grey goes missing, Iris must decipher the mystery of their past. Fantasy. For senior high and older readers.

<u>Today Tonight Tomorrow</u> by Rachel Lynn Solomon. DB103424. After years competing with each other, Rowan and Neil have 24 hours left as high school students, and the two learn they share something much deeper than a rivalry. Romance. For senior high and older readers.

The Final Six by Alexandra Monir.

DB090420. On a future Earth, where humanity is at war with the environment, 24 teens are chosen to train for the Europa Mission and Draft, a global space mission to colonize Jupiter's moon. But only



six will go. Science Fiction. For senior high and older readers.
