History of coexistence challenges

- Canola and Brassicaceae specialty seed production in the Willamette Valley
 - Concerns about a decrease in genetic purity and value due to pollen contamination
 - Canola as a rotation crop with non-Brassicaceae crops; reduce disease and weed problems
- 2006-2010 research by OSU
- Passage of HB 2427 (2013) and HB 3382 (2015)

Process

 Develop recommendations based on OSU 2017 report

- April to October 2018
 - 12 internal ODA meetings
 - 6 external meetings
- Submit recommendations to Legislative Assembly Nov. 15, 2018

Recommendations for ConsiderationUnder Current ODA Authority

- Advisory board and possible exclusion zones
 - Boundaries of control areas
 - Type of rapeseed species and varieties that could be produced
 - Enforcement of control area orders

No exclusion zones

Recommendations for Consideration - Require Legislative Action

- Extend current system
 - 500 acres in the Willamette Valley Control area
 - Or, phase-in additional acres over a set time period
- Pinning for all Brassica
 - Direction to ODA or OSU to provide a mandatory public pinning system

Moving Forward

 Begin the rulemaking process by the end of the year to ensure certainty to all growers in the Willamette Valley after July 2019

 2019 Legislature could provide different direction/authority
