


### **What is a Conservation Easement?**


- A <u>voluntary</u> real estate contract
- Between a landowner and land trust or government agency
- Permanently limits use of the land
- To protect specific conservation values, including agriculture.




### **How Does a Conservation Easement Work?**

Land ownership comes with many property rights

In a conservation easement, a landowner voluntarily sells or donates certain rights.







### **Appraisal Valuation "Before & After" Analysis**

Both for purchases and donations





### **Common Scenarios**

- 1. Succession: Cash and/or Donation
- 2. Reduce Property Value to Ag Value
- 3. Expand the operation often with 1031 exchange
- 4. Business flexibility with tax deduction

# 2024 OAHP Project Pipeline & Demand



- 14 potential projects from 6 land trusts in Oregon (3 in Lake County)
- Protecting 9 ranches, 4 farms & 1 orchard
- Total of 18,977 acres protected
- Fulfilling \$11.6-11.8M in OAHP funding requests
- Variety of ag production:
   Wool/lamb, grass-fed beef, pork,
   wheat and grass seed, barley,
   organic vegetables, and hazelnuts



# What We Do

### **AG LAND PROTECTION**

Our primary tool is a <u>working land easement</u> — a voluntary agreement where the landowner sells or donates their development rights to keep their land available for agriculture forever.

#### **EDUCATION**

We educate farmers and ranchers, attorneys and appraisers, the general public, and decision-makers about <u>farmland loss</u>, <u>easements</u>, and <u>succession</u>.

### **TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE**

In addition to holding working land easements, <u>OAT helps other organizations do the same</u> by providing education and assistance.

### **ADVOCACY**

We advocate alongside state and national partners for <u>funding to protect agricultural land</u>.





### 2023 Successes

- This year we have protected over 27,000 acres of agricultural land, representing 8% of the total protected land base in Oregon.
- We have 41 additional land protection projects in the works that would protect almost 170,000 acres!
- We educated over 1,000 farmers, ranchers, and service providers on farm succession planning and working land easements
