

Review of Standards and Requirements for Opioid Prevention Lessons in Oregon Schools

Oregon Senate Bill 238 & House Bill 5204

Oregon Senate Bill 238

- Updated Division 22 standards
- School drug and alcohol prevention programs must reflect the dangers posed by opioids, synthetic opioids, and counterfeit drugs
- Districts and public charter schools must implement ODE Synthetic Opioid Prevention lessons in grades 6, 7, 8, and once in high school (starting 2024-25)


House Bill 5204

 Appropriated funds to ODE to create new curriculum supplements on the dangers of synthetic opioids (in development)





How to Teach to Different Audiences

Strategies for Different Audiences

- Universal Design for Learning (UDL)
- Allow for multiple types of engagement, representation and action and expression
- High Leverage Practices (HLP)
- Examples include explicit instruction, providing scaffolded supports, adapting tasks to specific learning goals and providing positive feedback
- Incorporate Augmentative and Alternate Communication (AAC)
- Work with speech language pathologists to ensure all students are heard and included
- TIES 5-15-45 Tool
- Helps teachers plan for more inclusive instruction based off an exisiting lesson plan
