Dear Parents and Community Members,

This redesigned annual report card issued by the Oregon Department of Education offers a comprehensive picture of what Anytown Elementary School offers.

In the 2012-2013 school year, Anytown Elementary School received an Overall State Rating of average. That means our students are performing about as well on standards-based tests and graduating in about the same numbers as students at other Oregon elementary schools. When compared to schools with similar student demographics, Anytown Elementary School is above average. That means our students are generally outperforming those at like-schools.

Key academic highlights:

- 89% met/exceeded state standards for reading
- 80% met/exceeded state standards for math


In the same time frame, however, we have seen relatively slow growth in our reading scores among English language learners. We've chosen to address this issue by focusing our resources on implementing the new Common Core State Standards (CCSS), which reinforce literacy across content areas. We promise to deliver the same excellence you have come to expect from us here at Anytown Elementary School.




Compared to elementary schools with similar student demographics in 2012-13, this school is better than average.
