Key Goals and Takeaways from the Summit

- In response to a request that came out of the SOESD Curriculum Directors meeting, we wanted to know what the students felt like they wanted you and the Superintendents to know.
 - The number one issue that came up with Everyone was Hate Speech.

?One of our fellow partners came up with this idea, that I think said it best:

I have been really pondering the massive hate speech problem occurring not only at my school, but every school across the state, for some type of solution, or major step to take.

A solution that has been really speaking to me, would involve adding hate speech to the list of child abuses covered in the mandatory reporting responsibilities. This would make it the law to report these incidents and be treated as the serious safety issue that they are, as well as creating a direct Statewide legal accountability for every adult that works with youth, and School Board legal accountability.

However, I do not know the processes involved in progressing something like this, or the resources required to do so, or how much of a battle this would be, I just believe that it needs to happen. I am writing you all for help, guidance, ideas, resources, advice, etc., and look forward to your responses.

Key Goals and Takeaways from the Summit

- ?First Summit under SOESD
- ?We came together with at Least 3 local CBO's, 8 school districts, two universities, one community college, the statewide *Black Student Success Network* (Organized by the Oregon Community Foundation), and a host of parent and community volunteers.
- ?We had 154 students register and participate
- ?We had classes for grades 3-12 and we put it together in a Hybrid format, by using Zoom as our main landing page, which we did with Software known as WHOVA, as well as have Districts provide classrooms for the day, just for this program. Districts provided transportation for all their students to get to their specific centralized locations. It Literally took a Village.
- ?There were some issues, but as such a grand undertaking, we have to say it was a success, because the **Students Said It Was**.













































?Once we Finish the Summit, I asked Marvin if we were now ready to take on the Black Youth Summer Institute? This Was his reply:



2nd Annual Black Youth Summer Institute (BYSI) June 15 - 19, 2022

This week-long Afro-Centric summer residency camp, where students will live in a residential hall at SOU, is open to students completing 5th grade by spring of 2022 through 12th grade. BYSI is an opportunity for students to explore a wide range of classes, physical/recreational activities, as well as events that highlight Black/African-American culture.

Students will participate in classes that develop their public speaking techniques, enhance their critical thinking skills, and help discover their capacity for impacting their communities.

This "live & dine on-campus" camp will be a highlight with students who have a genuine interest in knowing more about the black diaspora, the college experience, and themselves. BYSI provides students the opportunity to not just learn their own history, but to also build a lasting community in the southern Oregon region.

Letter to Parents of students who identify as African Americans or Black Immigrants in Southern Oregon

The idea of this Institute came out what we have seen as a need to help students who identify as Black or African American, not just see, but feel a sense of community in southern Oregon. We wanted the students to know they are supported here and that are not alone. We want them to not feel that that this region is somewhere they can always call home, and have success.

We always say that our focus is three-fold: 1). Serve as Advocates for the Black/African American Students of the Rogue Valley, 2). Support the families of those students in whatever way they deem necessary, and 3). Educate the educators on practices to make sure our students are supported and safe. Some have asked why we use the turn "Black/African American." We do so because we want to make sure that our youth realize we are not just there for students who identify as African American, but also students who have come to our region who are African Immigrants, and anyone who is a part of the African Diaspora.

We are honored and proud that you have given us the opportunity to be a part of your student's lives through this Institute. It is a continuation of our February program, the Black Youth Leadership Summit, and it allows students to have an experience similar to a university experience, where they will take classes, learn how to work in a community, share in cultural awareness, and learn about their extraordinary role in our nation's history.

From classes on the Civil Rights Movement and Positive mental health practices, to outdoor activities that include rock climbing and hiking in southern Oregon, to sharing together two Oregon Shakespeare Festival shows, one from one of the best known African

American Playwrights of all time, your students will be enriched and filled. We hope that not only will they learn, but that they come back with more questions, that will encourage them to continue on a life-long adventure of learning who they are, and what a grand people they come from.





 - Added as stand-alone objective
 - Incorporated into existing objectives/strategies
 - Added to guidance document rather than included in core plan

Tentative Timeline/Fall Workplan and beyond

- September community engagement planning; updated 2021-22 data added
- October community engagement and planning cont.
- November Plan edits
- December AG retreat with first draft final
- January 2023 incorporating AG retreat feedback
- February 2023 presenting finished draft to AG
- March 2023 publish updated Plan

Areas identified as in Need of Further Attention

- Discipline
- Immigration
- Reducing Impact of Bias & Racism

- Recruitment & Retention of Black Teachers and Administrators

ELD- Early Learning Department

- ALL content areas to incorporate representational and affirming inclusion within curriculum and instructional practices
 - Idea to support structure is alignment with <u>Ethnic Studies (HB 2845/ HB 2023)</u>

Data

- What data is being collected and by which department/program in ELD.
 - clear picture of what they will be collected by end of September
 - recently formed a committee to address objectives and data collection
- We want to use this data to inform AABSS Plan strategies
- Moving forward; it was suggested that ELD joins and presents to Advisory Board (accountability partner)

Health

In the updated plan having separate sections that address the following two areas

Mental Health

- Significant mental health problem in schools and the need for culturally-specific addresses/support & strength-based approach
- Intersectionalities of identity (LGBTQ2SIA+)
 - There may be a way to design the School Climate and Culture survey (which is a new survey recommended by the LGBTQ2SIA+ SS plan to be created by ODE/OHA), so that it is gathering/offering data for all districts on feelings of belonging, connectedness, mental health supports, supportive educators, supportive peers, discipline, and bullying/discrimination in an intersectional way
- Currently in our plan mental health is mentioned in discipline of students. We would like to have mental health as a separate category that addresses holistically mental health of African-American Black Students
 - How do we address teacher bias?
 - Violation of civil rights?

General Health & Well-Being

- Safety (broadly defined mental, physical, racist bullying)
- Physical health care access
- Social support (spaces for students to feel supported/thrive)

Special Education

Problem/Concern

Over- referring Black students

 Students who receive special education services are more likely to receive modified diploma vs regular diploma

Early identification and support services for students
Behavioral vs learning disabilities

Strategies

- Need for a proactive not reactive early identification/intervention
- Investigate difference between behavioral and learning disability in students
- Ensure family supports with family rights and transition goal process in IEP meetings
 - advocacy organizations, county services, etc.
