Grounding Our Work

ODE's Equity Stance

Education equity is the equitable implementation of policy, practices, procedures, and legislation that translates into resource allocation, education rigor, and opportunities for historically and currently marginalized youth, students, and families including civil rights protected classes. This means the restructuring and dismantling of systems and institutions that create the dichotomy of beneficiaries and the oppressed and marginalized.

Antiracist Policy Making

Antiracist

One who is supporting an antiracist policy through their actions or expressing an antiracist idea.

Antiracist Policy

An antiracist policy is any measure that produces or sustains racial equity between racial groups.

Policy: Written and unwritten law, rules, procedures, processes, regulations, and guidelines that govern people.





The Department shall form an advisory group consisting of individuals representing:

- Urban and rural communities;
- Indigenous and immigrant populations;
- English language learners;
- Individuals with disabilities;
- Parents and students;
- Youth who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer or another minority gender or sexual orientation;
- Community-based organizations serving Latinx youth and families; and
- Education stakeholders, including representatives of the Early Learning Division, the Youth Development Division and the Higher Education Coordinating Commission.

Responsibilities of members:

- Attend advisory group meetings. Meetings will be held remotely to allow for full participation of advisory group members across the state.
- Share relevant information from communities to the Advisory Group.
- Connect with constituents and local networks to share with the Advisory Group.
- Review minutes and materials prior to meetings.
- Inform ODE staff if you anticipate missing one or more meetings.

Timeline & Next Steps:

- Today: Current Advisory members whose terms end in June 2023 will confirm to Michael if they wish to renew for a 2nd term by March 3rd
- March: ODE staff will review and revise Letter of Intent and application process to share with Advisory Group at March meeting for feedback
- April: Outreach and recruitment of new Advisory members
- **May**: Review and select new Advisory members


