Douglas ESD is the current regional learning cohort hub.</li> <li>Questions:         <ul> <li>Joe Leykam: How are we going to scale trainings? How will we get other levels of trainings out to other school districts, and what other strategies that could be used to support school districts and ESDs?</li> <li>Rusha Grinstead provided information about CMS funding and providing training for the state. Does intend to scale up but have to figure out funding.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
	Leanne Mixa Bettin shared an update on the Medicaid Billing Pilot Project. Questions:
	Cynthia Branger Munoz asked what are districts needing support with.  • Leanne shared that staffing has been an issue they are helping pilot districts identifying individuals who can complete what task.  • Leanne also shared that knowing where to start can be difficult. It takes sustained support to onboard brand new districts.
	Katie O'Day shared in the chat that there are SBHS recognized providers (OT/PT/SLP) in the districts who may have experience with billing who can provide information to help understand Medicaid.

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OHA Policy and Program Updates (15 minutes)  - Lasa Baxter and Judy Weaver  • Procedure codes for TSPC-licensed practitioners  • Operations and training plan for personal care services	Lasa Baxter provided an update on Policy and Program Planning.  Questions:  Stacy Michaelson asked for a high level of the framework for how the team is working on what counts as PCS under Medicaid.  • Lasa Baxter shared that the team is working with engaging and gathering scenarios from the field  Lisa Ledson asked about collaboration and PCS and ODDS  • Jennifer Smith shared that there has been engagement with all the PCS branches with OHA and ODHS and how each program runs  Wendy Niskanen shared that there have been discussions about the distinction between PCS and DHC but there are other things that do not fall within either category  Joe Leykam shared that there is encouragement to look at QMHP and QMHA. There is new recommendation	
Policy Discussion: Board Registered Associates (20 minutes) - Rusha Grinstead  Review background materials  Discuss impact of OHA policy consideration	Rusha Grinstead provided an update on Board Registered Associates and the potential policy change which would require them to work in Certificate of Approval holding agencies to bill Medicaid. She is seeking information about the number of these practitioners working in schools so that they can make an argument to allow schools an exemption. Questions:  Wendy Niskanen asked if SLP associates gaining their practice hours in schools are able to bill.  • Kim Giansante replied that if they are doing their CFY then they can and their supervisor has to sign off. If they are doing their practicum then they cannot.  Joe Leykam shared that he appreciates the work being completed.

	Erny Womack asked if the policy change is effective now, or next year.  • Rusha Grinstead said it is not effective right now.
	Stacy Michaelson asked about the data connected with the policy and how many people are working in the schools. Asked a clarifying question on if this just about Medicaid billing or who can be employed in the school?  • Rusha Grinstead shared that they are looking at an exemption for the school setting and the overall policy is about Medicaid billing.
	Leanne Mixa Bettin shared the difficulties with gathering the data.
	Joe Leykam shared the challenges with gathering data and there aren't good systems set up for it. Stacy Michaelson shared in the chat if ESDs and their connections to student service directors could help identify staff numbers.
	Katie O'Day shared in the chat that there is a reduction in mental health professionals due to budget cuts in Portland.
	Leanne Mixa Bettin asked if SMAC members could help with mapping who and where staff is employed.
	Wendy Niskanen pointed out the fact that job descriptions do not always match licensure.
	Morgan Allen asked if they were seeking to change policy or were looking to update OARs. Morgan offered to work with Stacy to try and gather the data within their networks. He noted that it would not be perfect data but it could help.  • Rusha Grinstead confirmed that the data will help inform rule/policy.
