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



Western Oregon HCP Project Phases

Phase 1: HCP Initiation & Scoping

(Timeline: November 2018)

- Engage stakeholders
- Refine the species list
- Conduct a Business Case Analysis

Phase 2: Strategy Development

(Timeline: July 2020)


- Develop 1st Administrative Draft of the Western Oregon HCP
- Engage stakeholders

Phase 3: National Environmental Policy Act Analysis

(Timeline: November 2021)

- Complete Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act
- Obtain an Incidental Take Permit

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




HCP Process Timeline






Draft HCP Development Timeline

 Balance economies of scale with manageable size

Consider:


- Political or administrative boundaries
- Ecological boundaries
- Physical boundaries (e.g., watersheds)
- Regulatory agency jurisdictions


Consider different boundaries:

- Permit area: where covered activities occur
- Plan area (area of analysis)
- Shifting land ownership during permit term
- Mitigation or conservation area


Geographic Coverage


Lake States Forest Management Bat HCP (47.3 million acres)






Washington State Department of Natural Resources HCP (9.3 million acres)

Permit term proposed to be at least 50 years

- Key considerations
 - Are covered activities predictable?
 - How long will the conservation take?
 - How uncertain is the ecological future?



Consider criteria:

Location: In plan area?


Impact: Take of covered species likely?

Data: Know enough to describe and quantify activities and impacts?

Control: In control of permit applicants?

Species Selection Criteria


Range: Species in the plan area?

Impact: Likely to result in take of covered species?

Status:

- Listed species
- Non-listed species with potential to become listed during permit term

Data: Are data sufficient to evaluate impacts and develop conservation measures?



Oregon Solutions


Where there is support for a "project" but implementation requires aligning multiple sectors and resources







- In existence since 1990.
- Part of the Oregon University System's broader program for Alternative Dispute Resolution.
- Legislatively established program for conflict resolution.
- Provide mediation and other alternative dispute resolution services to public bodies. (ORS 36.179)
- Increase the use of alternative dispute resolution to resolve disputes involving the State of Oregon. (ORS 183.502(5))
- A neutral forum and expert facilitation/mediation helps parties reach agreement on contentious public issues.



Common Principles

Joint Ownership: Operating as a neutral forum for joint responsibility and ownership

Community Supported: Convening the people most impacted by a problem as the best ones to solve it.

Inclusive: Increasing access to and assuring meaningful participation in decision making leading to the development of more equitable solutions.


Consensus Seeking: Seeking solutions that are mutually supported to address all interests to the greatest extent possible so they are more durable.

Results Oriented: Employing catalytic processes to help people take action together on things that matter.

Leaders as Conveners: Engaging elected officials to use their unique authority to bring people together to solve public issues.


