Key responsibilities:

Cleaner air, warming and cooling

Senate Bill 762 (2021): Wildfire Hazard Mitigation Act

- Established ODHS clear air grants program
- Appropriated \$5.2 million to ODHS for the establishment of new cleaner air shelters in rural and frontier communities

Senate Bill 1536 (2022): Emergency Heat Relief Act

- Expanded grant program eligibility to include Tribal Nations and public schools
- Appropriated \$2 million to ODHS for the establishment or improvement of public warming and cooling centers

ODHS responsibilities under SB 80

- Lead state agency for supporting cleaner air, warming and cooling center operations
- Collaborate with OHA to align evacuation and emergency sheltering operations
- Coordinate with OHA in setting grant award priorities




2024 winter storm response

Warming centers and mass care

- Supported more than **100 warming centers** throughout the state
- Provided **4,470 meals**
- Coordinated warming center volunteers – **184 volunteers** across 23 counties joined the effort
- Activated 211info, which answered **4,112 calls** statewide
- Deployed SatRunners to **three locations**

Keeping people safe

- Supported **three counties** in locating people with electricity-dependent medical devices
- Partnered with Area Agencies on Aging to contact and provide emergency supports to more than **1,000 in-home consumers and 500 long-term care facilities and adult foster homes.**
- Deployed a generator trailer and coordinated delivery of oxygen tanks to **facilities serving older adults.**
