Data Governance: A Kitchen Analogy


Data Governance is the exercise of authority, control, and shared decision-making over the management of data assets.

Forming the Data Governance Council

- Started with the "data people" analysts, stewards, and program partners who work with data daily.
- Began as an OHA effort with strong engagement from Health Analytics, Public Health, and Equity & Inclusion.
- Focused on operations-level needs improving data quality, access, and understanding where work happens.
- Quickly realized key voices were missing including our ODHS partners and other critical data owners.
- Learned we needed alignment from the top a shared, executive vision to connect siloed efforts.




"Pivot"

- Recognized we were moving too fast.
- Needed consistency and shared understanding –
 Staff supported the idea, but definitions and goals
 varied widely.
- Expanded the conversation Brought in additional teams and revisited ODHS to create a truly crossagency approach.
- Shifted focus to leadership alignment Executive sponsorship became essential to set vision and direction.
- Committed to communication and change management – Slowed the pace to build trust, shared language, and lasting partnerships.




Standing up Cross-Agency Data Governance

- Shifted focus to the top: Formed a cross-agency Executive Leadership Team (ELT) spanning OHA and ODHS.
- Brought together 37 directors and leaders:
 Representing divisions and programs serving over 10,000 staff.
- Made the business case for collaboration: Showing how joint governance improves services, decision-making, and outcomes.
- Aligned data governance with agency strategy: Framed governance as key to well-being and health equity goals.
- Learned to teach in context: Introduced governance concepts through storytelling and practical examples.




Guiding Principles

Reforming the Data Governance Council

- DGC members designated by ELT: Each division and program nominated representatives to ensure balanced cross-agency participation.
- **Built on existing momentum:** Many members came from the original data governance kickoff, bringing enthusiasm and experience.
- Listened first: Conducted interviews with DGC members to understand awareness, needs, and pain points around data sharing and quality.
- Aligned strategy with standards: Mapped DGC priorities to the DMBOK framework and to ELT goals.
- Established operational focus areas: Industry-aligned priorities now guide our work for the year ahead.



Looking Forward to 2026

Launching a "Data Governance Foundations" workgroup

to define the roles of data owner, steward, and custodian within our agencies.

Strengthening the ELT–DGC partnership

ELT provides guidance; DGC implements and operationalizes. **Unifying existing governance efforts**

by aligning and standardizing ad-hoc groups and processes already in place.

Back to the Kitchen

- Leadership provides vision and cohesion connecting individual data efforts into a shared direction.
- Clear roles and responsibilities build confidence

 everyone understands their part in managing and using data.
- Standards and processes ensure safety and quality — consistency enables trust and responsible use.
- Communication and collaboration bring it all together — coordination across programs creates better outcomes.
- Governance turns complexity into clarity —
 aligning people, data, and purpose toward a common
 goal.
