PIP Goals and Measurable Outcomes

Goal 1: Reduce repeat maltreatment and strengthen system supports that help children remain safely at home whenever possible.

Key Strategies	Lead Measures
Improve safety management.	1. Percentage of safety plans with monthly ongoing review. 2. Percentage of CPS assessments completed within 60 days. 3. Percentage of children with monthly face-to-face contact with caseworker.
Utilize family preservation best practices.	1. Number of completed In-Home Services Candidacy Determinations (ISCD) within the month. 2. Percentage of children who remain in home safely.

Goal 2: Increase placement resources to meet demand in real time.

Key Strategies	Lead Measures
Focused recruitment of relatives to increase the number of children placed with family.	1. Number of new relative and non-relative resource families certified during the month. 2. Percentage of children initially placed with a relative during the month.
Provide enhanced services to support resource homes.	1. Percentage of resource parents participating in KEEP, a specialized support groups for resource parents.

Goal 3: Improved services to strengthen placement stability

Key Strategies	Lead Measures
Implement placement stability processes to reduce placement disruptions.	1. Percentage of children in care with two or fewer placements during the month.

Core Measure

1:1 Resource Home to Child Ratio – the number of licensed and non-licensed homes at the end of the month and the number of children in custody who require placement at the end of the month.

Chaser Measures

Recent Maltreatment History – the percentage of children harmed after child welfare has already confirmed abuse or neglect.

Maintaining Family Connections – the percentage of children in care at the end of the month who are placed with relatives or kin.

Congregate Care – the percentage of days children are placed in group homes/congregate settings instead of living with a family.

Home Disruptions – the number of homes with children who had a move other than a trial home reunification or exit.

Continuous Quality Improvement and Secondary Oversight

Oregon understands there is no requirement to continue case reviews under Technical Bulletin 14. However, because several CFSR items are linked to reporting requirements for the Collaborative Agreement and embedded in the Child Welfare Continuous Quality Improvement data infrastructure, Oregon will continue case reviews across the state. Thus, Oregon requests to continue secondary oversight.
