



## Jump Start Your Review of ODOT's ADA Title II Transition Plan.

The July 2023 revision of the ODOT ADA Title II Transition Plan includes more information about ODOT's approach to accessibility than previous plans. Increased detail means more pages, but that doesn't make it difficult to review. More than half of the pages are appendices, including a detailed report of the results of ODOT's 2022 ADA Survey.
