

Law Enforcement Guide to Identifying

Medically At-Risk Drivers and Cognitive Impairment

Medical or Cognitive Impairment Signs

- Difficulty communicating / answering questions or not making sense.
- Confused when following instructions or has difficulty producing identification.
- Difficulty recalling the time, day of week, month or year.
- Unaware of surroundings and other vehicles or pedestrians.
- Does not know / understand the laws that were violated.

NOTE: Multiple health conditions can mimic DUII.

Unsafe or Dangerous Driving Behaviors

- Driving the wrong way on a one-way street.
- Driving in an on-coming traffic lane.
- Failing to stop or yield to other traffic.
- Making unsafe turns, especially left turns.
- Driving off the road.

Look for *Impairment Indicators* that raise red flags.

Impairment Indicators (include in report)

- Seizure, blackout, loss of consciousness.
- Impairment of consciousness including hallucinations / delusions.
- Confusion / disorientation.
- Lack of rational thought (describe in report).
- Attempted suicide / harm to others.
- Unexplained loss of vision.
- Vision concern (describe in report).
- Prescription medication / substance impairment.
- Diabetic episode (describe in report).
- Fell asleep while driving.
- Lost while driving.
- Multiple scrapes / dings on vehicle.
- Mental health instability (describe in report).
- Physical impairment (describe in report).
- Weakness / poor coordination (describe in report).
- Walking / balancing problems.

Questions to Ask the Driver

- Where are you going?
- Where are you coming from?
- What town/city/state are we in now?
- What is the day of the week, month, year, time of day?
- What is your home address?
- What is your date of birth?
- Are you taking any medications?

When appropriate, issue a citation or written warning. Doing so documents the driving behavior for future reference by other officers, DMV, and the Office of Administrative Hearings, among others.

When there is reason to believe the driver may not be able to drive safely, report them to DMV via the Driver Evaluation Request. For more information, see the Oregon At-Risk Reporting for Law Enforcement webpage.
