Research Stage 1 Problem Statement

PROPOSED TITLE: Applying Updated HEC-18 Scour Guidance to Develop Oregon-Specific, Risk-Based Best Practices for Resilient and Right-Sized Bridge Design

1. Concisely describe the transportation issue (including problems, improvements, or untested solutions) that Oregon needs to research.

Oregon needs to research how new national guidance on bridge scour, specifically the updated HEC-18, should be applied within the state's diverse river systems. This includes evaluating how the new risk-based methodologies compare with Oregon's legacy scour assessment practices, identifying where performance metrics differ, and determining best practices tailored to local hydraulic, geomorphic, and infrastructure conditions. The effort should also include developing an Oregon-specific training workshop to ensure consistent application of the updated guidance statewide.

2. What final product or information needs to be produced to enable this research to be implemented?

The final products would include an Oregon-specific workshop on applying the updated HEC-18 guidance, recommended best practices for inclusion in the Oregon Hydraulics Manual bridge-scour sections, and a documented review of how to apply risk-based design and engineering judgment when using the new methodologies. Implementation will also require access to the in-development FHWA draft guidance to ensure Oregon's practices align with forthcoming national standards.

Implementation of this project advances the updated HEC-18 risk-based scour methodologies from field-demonstration and operational evaluation (FHWA Technology Readiness Level (TRL) 7) to the development of Oregon-specific guidance, manual updates, and training materials ready for statewide implementation (TRL 8)

5. State of Oregon Decision Making Lenses

Oregon envisions a transportation system that is resilient, this means a system that is durable in the face of seismic events and extreme weather to avoid negative impacts, withstand them or bounce back quickly to resume system function. We seek research that improves the ability of the transportation system to adapt or cope with more frequent and extreme weather events. This may include innovations in data and data sharing, construction materials and project design, communication, emergency planning and response, and more. Similarly, we seek research that avoids negative impacts on key habitats and ecosystems that can buffer or reduce damage to infrastructure and improve environmental conditions for wildlife and native vegetation. For definitions and details please review the equity vision, goals, and objectives of the ODOT Strategic Action Plan and Oregon Transportation Plan.
