Project Overview

We are bringing over 25,000 sidewalk curb ramps into compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility standards on state highways across Oregon. People with disabilities and everyone who uses sidewalks along the highways will benefit from these upgrades. In the Portland-metro area, these upgrades are starting along and near OR 10 (Southwest Naito Parkway), OR 99W (Southwest Barbur Boulevard), OR 43 (South Macadam Avenue) and I-5 as part of Phases 1 and 6.

Nighttime Noise

Most of the work will take place during the day, but some night work is necessary for this project. Nighttime hours will be approximately 8 p.m. to 5 a.m. For any noise-related concerns associated with nighttime work, contact the 24/7 noise hotline at: **503-294-1301**.

Construction Impacts

During construction, there will be temporary delays and sidewalk closures at intersections on the state highways. All roads will remain open. We will provide accessible paths around the work zones for people walking, biking and rolling. It usually takes one to two weeks to complete work on an individual corner. To better maintain access to nearby businesses and services, only one corner per intersection will be under construction at a time.
