

device, including bicycles, scooters, electric-assist	
bicycles (e-bikes), electric scooters (e-scooters), and	
other small, lightweight, wheeled conveyances."

	 a. Researching this! 3. Can these funds help with launching bikeshare service area expansion? What about e-scooter share? a. No bikeshare operations. Scootershare operations unclear. 4. Will the applicant know which pot of money they are receiving? Will all projects be a combination of state and federal? a. Federal funds require a state match. Federal reporting requirements are pretty strict. We would like to support a wider range of projects with only state funds to make it more accessible. 5. Has the match amount already been decided? a. 10.27%. That amount is already set in stone. 6. Do we have a contact at FHWA to help with clarification? a. Yes. We also have ODOT staff who can advise. b. Group comment: It would be great to have someone give clarity to CBO's.

	 What varies: minimum \$ needed to complete projects 		
	and letters of support. Oregon Community Paths (OCP)		
	require letters of support from community leaders.		
	Other programs have them as optional but		
	recommended.		
	Review & scoring		
	 Some programs have internal review process where ODOT staff review first or are the only ones reviewing 		
	and scoring. Others have external committees that		
	provide input. OCP and SRTS are statutorily required to		
	have committees.		
	 Equity is scored and considered differently in each 		
	program. For example, OCP ties equity back to the		
	Transportation Disadvantaged Index (TDI). Safety and		
	multimodal access are also high priority categories.		
	Timeline considerations		
	 Being aligned, or misaligned with the STIP cycle can vastly impact funding timelines. 		
	 It will take at least 7 months to get a large grant 		
	agreement executed.

Fe	ederal funding considerations		
	 16 entities in Oregon are currently certified to deliver 		
	federally funded projects. If they are not certified,		
	ODOT will have to deliver the project on their behalf. If		
	that happens, then we must include ODOT's delivery costs in the total project costs.		
	 Staff have yet to find large grant programs that allow 		
	non-profits to apply or encourage them to apply.		
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Gr	rants vs. discretionary funds		
	There are items at ODOT that look like grants but are		
	not actually grants where there is an open call for		
	applications, etc. Discretionary funds have calls for projects, but they might only be open to ODOT or		
	specific regions.

	between TO program and the IMP microgrants.
