Per Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 735-076-0000:

Purpose:

"...to preserve the independence, dignity, and self-esteem that result from providing one's own mobility,

So long as it is possible to do so without risk to oneself or to others.

Focus - on function:

"Drivers who have demonstrated unsafe or dangerous driving behaviors." and/or

"...those drivers who have a mental or physical condition or impairment that may affect" the ability to drive safely.

INCLUDES ACTIVE ADDICTION: A LIKELY CAUSE OF CHRONIC DUII.



Program Components & Reporters

Components

- Mandatory Reporting specific medical professionals
- Non-Mandatory Reporting LEOs & everyone else

Reporters

- Medical Professionals 60% of accepted reports (Mandatory & Non-Mandatory combined)
- Law Enforcement 35+% of accepted reports
- Anyone/everyone else family, friends, neighbors, the court, DMV staff, ...





DUII... or something else?

Many health conditions can appear as DUII,

not only those that are age related:

- Seizure disorder,
- Diabetes,
- Cardiac conditions,
- Early onset cognitive decline (as early as late 30s),
- Developmental or Mental Health conditions,
- Medication-induced impairment,
- Combinations thereof, ...





Intervention vs. Investigation

Reported Missing

- Search ensued including air and water resources.
- Suspended after several days.

Investigation determined...

- The day she was reported missing, stopped three times over several hours on suspicion of DUII.
- Released when not DUII.
- She stopped several more times, lost and confused, asking for help.

Costs

- Human: life lost and family impact.
- Organizational: multi-day, multijurisdiction investigation.

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Body of Missing Oregon Woman Discovered in Submerged Car

Divers confirm that the submerged car has a body inside, it is probably Dena Kline who has been missing since February 2006.

(OREGON CITY) - The body of a woman missing since February, 2006 has been discovered in an automobile located near the Sports Craft Marina in Oregon City.

Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Spokesman Jim Strovink says they are fairly sure 90-year old Dena Daphne Kline's remains have been found submerged in the automobile she was reported missing in, a 1990, Honda, Accord, Teal green in color, with Idaho license plate K332915.

The dive team was called out at approximately 7:43 PM this evening. They have now completed a dive into this body of water and confirm this is the same vehicle Dena Delphine Kline was driving when she disappeared in February, 2006.

Strovink says Clackamas County Sheriff's Marine personnel confirm this vehicle is occupied with a deceased person; although, the identification of this person has not been officially confirmed – it is 'reasonable to presume' the deceased is that of Dena Kline, said Strovink.

He says the Clackamas County Deputy Medical Examiner is responding to this location and will proceed with the Medical Examiners portion of this death investigation.

Often the first point of contact for drivers who may no longer be able to drive safely...

- Driver doesn't have a healthcare provider, doesn't see one regularly, or the provider is reluctant to report;
- Their condition is Chronic and/or Progressive, getting worse, and the driver hasn't noticed;
- Their condition is intermittently progressive they have good and bad days with fewer good days as the condition progresses - LEO may see that even before family does;
- They're avoidant or in denial; often despite family efforts to intervene and sometimes despite health care provider efforts as well.





Importance of LEO Reporting...

When LEOs submit a report that meets reporting requirements:

- Report can be accepted and driver suspended for DMV to assess:
 - Medical eligibility and
 - Ability to drive safely.
- Suspensions more likely to be affirmed at hearing*, especially when includes supporting documentation: incident report, crash report, etc.

^{*}Officers are <u>not</u> subpoenaed

Rejected reports have value!

DMV has the authority to combine multiple reports that have been or would be rejected but, when combined, do meet requirements.






Suspensions Types & Regaining Driving Privileges

Suspension Types –

- Immediate effective five days from date of notice (39% of suspensions in 2022)
- Non-Immediate effective 30-90 days from date of notice (61% of suspensions in 2022)

Regaining Privileges — requirements contained in Suspension Notice; may include:

- A determination of medical eligibility requiring a driver to demonstrate their health condition is well-controlled or resolved, including addiction.
 - Made by DMV's Medical Determination Officer, a licensed MD, DO, PA, or NP;
 - Based on information contained in a Driver Medical Report included with
 Suspension completed by driver's medical provider.
- A Certificate of Vision from a vision provider indicating meets state vision standards.
- DMV testing, including vision, knowledge and drive.







The At-Risk Driver Program - Regaining Driving Privileges:

A Determination of Medical Eligibility

When a Determination of Medical Eligibility is required:

- A Driver Medical Report must be completed and submitted by the driver's treating healthcare provider addressing *all* Reported
 Concerns.
- Medical Determination Officer can require additional information. When a condition is chronic or progressive e.g., diabetes, seizure disorder, chronic substance abuse (a likely cause of chronic DUII), ... may include proof of compliance with treatment.
- Once Medically Eligible the condition is well-controlled or resolved – the driver may have one or more recertification requirements to ensure condition(s) remains stable and wellcontrolled over time.
 - Recertification failure results in new suspension and the process restarts.
 - Recertification success leads to release from the program.
 - Once released, a new report for the same (or a different) health condition restarts the process.

The At-Risk Driver Program: Who and When to Report

Who:

- Drivers you have contact with during a traffic stop or response to a crash who...
 - May no longer be able to drive safely due to a possible health condition, based on your observations.
 - Aged 14 years and older.
- See NHTSA video: Law Enforcement and the Medically At-Risk Driver, linked at the top of the At-Risk Driver Reporting for Law Enforcement webpage.

When:

• The reason for your contact – a traffic stop or crash – was or may have been caused by a medical condition or impairment, or what appears to you to be one (including chronic

Remember - several different health conditions may appear similar to DUII and affect drivers of all ages, as

Chronic DUII qualifies for reporting. Another tool in the LEO toolbox...

Even when/if you think or believe someone else will or should report (e.g., family, medical
