SYMPOSIUM INFORMATION

As cannabis legalization and regulations evolve, the United States is at a tipping point. There are now several pending Congressional Bills related to cannabis including decriminalization and rescheduling of the drug. Thirty-six states have some form of medical marijuana, 18 States, D.C. Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, and Tribal nations have recreational marijuana laws with many other states exploring recreational marijuana for 2022. These continued changes in laws are impacting our courts and society. It is also creating a dynamic and sometimes confusing landscape for various disciplines including Law Enforcement, Judges, Drug Court Professionals, the Drug and Alcohol Testing Industry, Academia, and Employers Human Resource Associations & Organizations.





The Symposium will engage and integrate associations and organizations, including law enforcement, academia, judges, drug court professionals, specialty court judges, the drug and alcohol testing industry, human resource specialists and others around the topic of cannabis by developing educational tracks and panels dedicated to each discipline along with an integrated approach with discussions.

There are three Keynotes, five Plenary Sessions, and three Breakout Sessions, one of which is discipline specific and the other two interdisciplinary. The goals of the Breakout sessions are to bring attendees up to speed on the latest developments regarding cannabis and the law and to provide open discussions regarding the attendees' experiences in addressing issues specific to their fields.

The moderator of each session will provide an overview and update regarding emerging issues associated with the session's theme (e.g., workplace drug testing), as well as pose key questions that may be addressed within the breakout session.

This will be followed by a moderated discussion addressing current challenges, approaches that have been utilized by various entities to date, and suggested paths forward. At the conclusion of the sessions the moderator (or designee) will report the discussions/recommendations to a Plenary Session, where the topics will be addressed via open discussion.

Virtual attendees will be able to participate in Q&A and engage with an online moderator in the Breakouts and Plenary Sessions

The Final Plenary will be an Open Discussion that will identify and elucidate the current issues related to the legalization of cannabis and its impact on law enforcement, academia, judges, drug court professional, the drug and alcohol testing industry, and human resources and make some recommendations for evidence-based practices.
