MASS CASUALTY INCIDENT

Berwick, Pennsylvania – August 13, 2022



DISCLAIMER

This is merely an overview of a mass casualty incident to aid with preparedness for outdoor events and not an in-depth discussion about the criminal investigation.

Prior to describing the actions taken by civilians and first responders on that fateful day, I offer that it is not my intention to offend anyone with my rendition of the event. I know the challenges that lie ahead of me attempting to identify everyone that had an active role during this event, therefore I sincerely apologize if I have left anyone one (1) person out of this rendition.



- Mass casualty incidents are tragic. Any incident that involves the loss of life is heartbreaking. During this mass casualty incident, many citizens jumped into action to assist the injured in the triage areas. The combined effort of emergency medical personnel, first responders and citizens are the reason there were far less tragic circumstances to endure. It has been and will continue to be very difficult for me to identify individual heroic efforts that day, as there were so many people that went above and beyond participating in this violent and challenging event.

BERWICK, PENNSYLVANIA

The Borough of Berwick Police Department is a full-service law enforcement agency with an authorized workforce of eighteen (18) sworn full-time Police Officers and two (2) civilian employees. The annual operating budget for the department is approximately two million dollars (\$2,000,000). The police department's service area comprises of three and a quarter (3.25) square miles and has a total population of over ten thousand (10,000) residents.



HISTORICAL DATA

The Borough of Berwick Police Department routinely has had multiple major incidents such as: a mass casualty incident, active shooter event, homicide and death investigations, serious aggravated assaults involving firearms and weapons, officer-involved shootings, a multi-story partial building collapse, rapes, high-risk warrant services, flooding, missing person searches and large-scale community events that have hosted thousands of persons. We have had multiple incidents where an actor utilized a vehicle as a weapon causing injuries and property damage.

As previously mentioned, last year we endured a mass casualty incident in-where a person used his motor vehicle as a weapon and intentionally drove it into a crowd of numerous people, the number of victims in that event was devastating. Sadly, the victims were gathered at a fundraising event to raise money for the family members of a catastrophic fatal residential fire in Nescopeck Borough that occurred previously. Nescopeck Borough is located in Luzerne County and has a population of approximately one thousand, six hundred (1,600) residents, it is located across the Susquehanna River from Berwick Borough, which is in Columbia County.

NESCOPECK RESIDENTIAL FIRE

On August 5, 2022 there was a devastating residential fire that occurred in the 700 block of First Street in Nescopeck Borough. As a result of that fire, the Pennsylvania State Police confirmed that ten (10) victims perished in the fire. It was further confirmed that there were seven (7) adult decedents which ranged in age from nineteen (19) to seventy-nine (79) years old, as well as three (3) juvenile victims, ages five (5), six (6) and seven (7) years old. Several family pets perished as well.

PRECURSOR

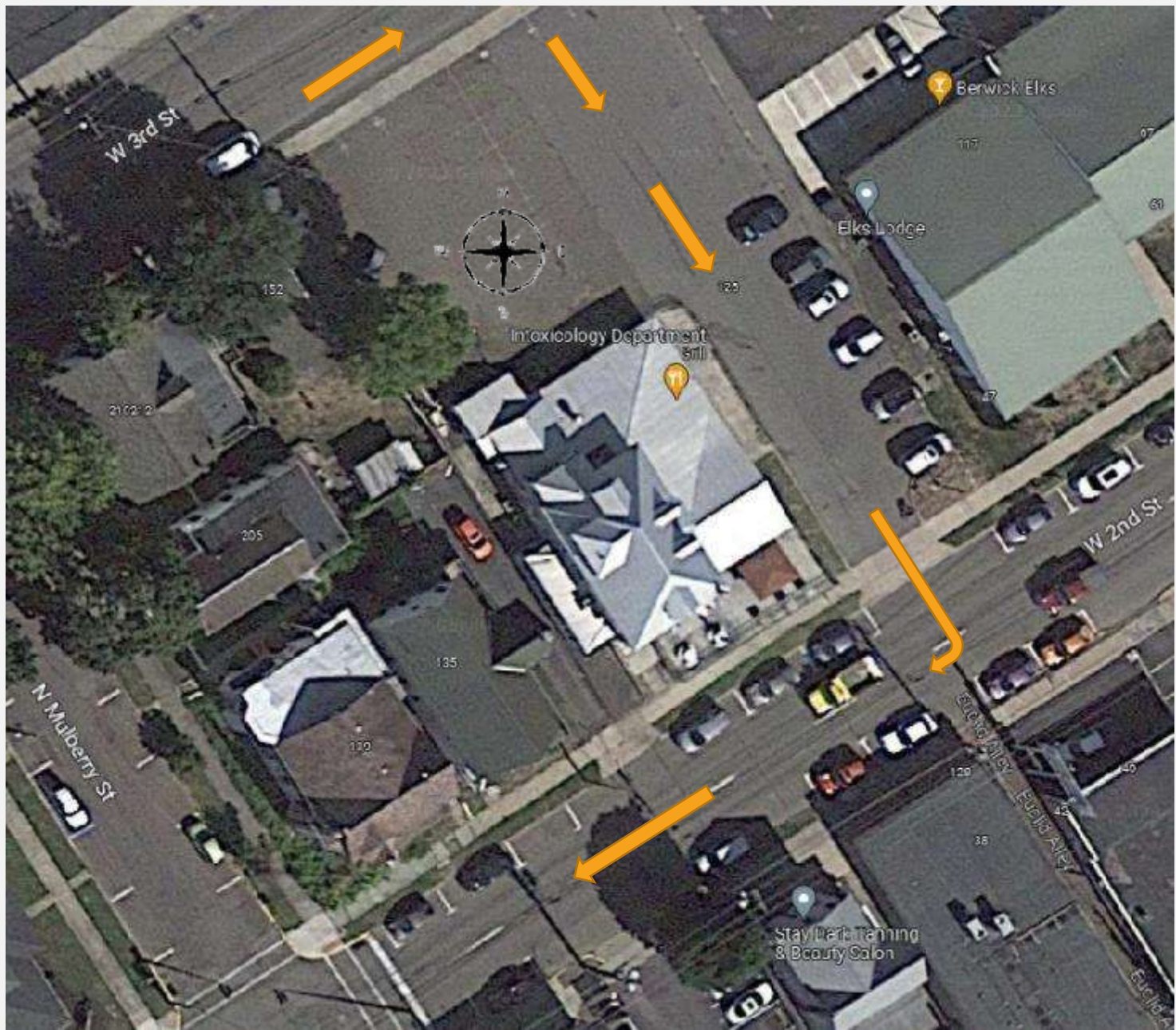
- The police department was asked to participate in the benefit at the Intoxicology Department (ID). Specifically, they wished for officers to compete in a water balloon fight. They requested five (5) officers to attend which would have made up a complete team. The winner would be the team with the last man standing and the proceeds would be donated. However, several officers had personal plans scheduled for that weekend and we were left with limited manpower on shift that date. Ultimately, we were not able to participate in the benefit.
- I had passed the benefit multiple times on August 13, 2022 and noticed how many people were in attendance. At approximately 1715hrs, as I was leaving the Berwick area to visit with my father, I noticed that the crowd was even larger than before. I was somewhat concerned by the crowd but contented because the benefit seemed to be very successful.

THE EVENT

- On August 13, 2022 at approximately 1812hrs the 911 center was advised that a vehicle drove into a crowd of people at the ID with multiple people down. The ID is a restaurant/bar in the Berwick Police area of responsibility (AOR) and it is positioned directly on a main traffic artery through the municipality. Once the 911 Center toned out this major incident, numerous resources from multiple disciplines quickly descended upon the scene. Berwick Police responded with a total of three (3) officers, Berwick Rescue did not wait for a full crew, which is normal protocol, and left quarters with a handful of members. Shortly after the dispatch, police arrived on scene and took efforts to gain control of the crime scene and collect necessary information. Berwick Rescue arrived on scene within five (5) minutes, immediately began casualty care and one (1) rescue member, Daniel Crispell, immediately began performing CPR on a victim for approximately thirty (30) minutes. Unfortunately, that victim was later pronounced as deceased at the scene.

THE EVENT

- First responders subsequently advised the 911 Center that there were multiple victims down, multiple patients with CPR in progress, originally it was reported that there were eight (8) confirmed victims, one (1) being pediatric and all had head and internal injuries. Berwick Fire Department requested that Geisinger Medical Center's (GMC) **Life Flight**, a medical helicopter, be placed on standby.
- Life Flight was initially contacted for three (3) helicopters. Berwick Fire Chief called for a landing zone (LZ) at Fowler Field, a nearby baseball field.
- A suspect vehicle description was provided and pushed out to police that were actively responding to the scene.
- Fire Police were toned out for traffic control at Front, 2nd and 3rd Streets.



THE EVENT

- EMA was notified and Jen Long responded to the 911 Center. EMA assisted the 911 Center with making necessary notifications and helped lighten the overall burden placed on 911 dispatchers.
- The Assistant Police Chief identified that Karleigh Curfman, MD was on scene when the incident happened and instantly began triaging the injured.
- Berwick Rescue Chief later identified that Douglas Frank Kupas, MD arrived on scene and assumed the role of Medical Command. Admittedly, until this occurred there was more confusion and chaos than order and control.
- Doctors Kupas and Curfman not only controlled the medical concerns at the scene, but also prepared the trauma center with the appropriate information and prepared staff for the incoming casualties.

THE EVENT

- It should be known that the rescue unit ran out of supplies within the first ten (10) minutes of being on scene.
- The first ambulance arrived and swiftly left transporting a injured victim to the local trauma center. When that happened, it took much needed medical supplies away from the scene.
- An update of the suspect vehicle description was later provided by the 911 Center.
- At 1836hrs Luzerne County 911 Center informed the Columbia County 911 Center that suspect actor and vehicle were possibly in police custody in Nescopeck Borough. The location where the suspect was located was less than two (2) miles away from the ID. However, the actor did not take a direct route to that location after the mass casualty incident.

THE EVENT

- Both the Columbia County and Luzerne County Coroner's Office were summoned to the scene.
- At 1845hrs three (3) helicopters landed, and took off with injured persons. An additional helicopter was inbound and cancelled.
- Medical Command cancelled the last two (2) helicopters. The total amount of helicopters requested was six (6).
- After all the helicopters left Fowler Field, the requirement for emergency traffic only on the 911 Center's priority radio channel was subsequently lifted.
- Berwick Police Command remained on scene for several hours later and didn't clear until 0346hrs the next day.

SUSPECT IN CUSTODY

- Approximately six (6) minutes after the mass casualty incident, at 1818hrs Luzerne County 911 received a call reporting that in the area of the 900 block of Ridgewood Avenue in Nescopeck Borough, a vehicle crashed into another vehicle and a male was assaulting a female with a hammer at the accident scene. At approximately 1834hrs the suspect was secured into police custody by Joshua Switzer of the Salem Township Police Department. Nescopeck Borough is not in the Salem Township Police Department's AOR, but Switzer was one (1) of the officers tasked with answering calls for service away from the crime scene at the Intoxicology Department.

SUSPECT IN CUSTODY

- As the suspect was secured into police custody, the female that he was assaulting with a hammer was found deceased next to the driver's side of the suspect vehicle. The decedent was later determined to be the suspect's mother. The hammer used to bludgeon the victim was found on the hood of the vehicle, which was a dark blue 2011 Honda Accord 4-door sedan, which sustained significant front-end damage to the bumper, headlights, hood and windshield. The damage was consistent with pedestrian impact.



INCIDENT COMMAND

- After the Assistant Police Chief notified me of the incident, it took me approximately thirty (30) minutes to arrive at the scene after the original dispatch came in. Amidst the chaos, upon first stepping on scene, it was evident that we had already received a monumental outpouring of mutual-aid support. The crime scene was secured, as best it could be at the time and we expanded it as needed. Triage areas were already established and victims were being treated by EMS and fire department personnel. ALS and BLS transportation efforts had already been arranged.
- Police often utilize the Incident Command Structure (ICS) model as a guide to follow during a critical incident. The five (5) major organizational functions of ICS are: command, operations, planning, logistics and financial.

INCIDENT COMMAND

- For the event, there was no incident command post, so to speak, we had two (2) crime scenes in two (2) different counties and PSP Major Case Team members were summoned to both scenes. There were a lot of witnesses to collect information from, so we utilized the outer perimeter of the Berwick scene because we had sufficient room off the crime scene but within the cordoned off area.
- The Columbia County District Attorney's Office already had representation on scene, the Pennsylvania State Police and numerous municipal law enforcement agencies were already in place, assigned tasks and doing work. Geisinger Medical Center took major efforts to be prepared for the influx of patients and were coordinating with medical personnel on scene. It was determined that the suspect was secured into police custody shortly after my arrival to the scene. Therefore, incident command decisions were not overwhelming because of the above mentioned efforts.

CHALLENGES AFTER THE CHAOS

- The District Attorney's Offices from both Columbia County as well as Luzerne County had to work out jurisdictional boundaries and plan accordingly for prosecution.
- The Superintendent of the Berwick Area School District (BASD) was in direct contact with me for an overview of the incident, and also regarding potential future lockdown and critical incident stress management (CISM) for students.
- Multiple social media platforms produced copious false narratives and speculation about the event.
- At the time of the incident, there were approximately seventy-five (75) individuals in the parking lot, including small children. It was very difficult for police to gather the appropriate information from each person at the scene as well as collect everyone's written and verbal statements, especially considering the state of shock and anger that so many individuals were experiencing.

CHALLENGES AFTER THE CHAOS

- Until a PSP Public Information Officer (PIO) was imbedded into the event, dealing with the constant barrage of media requests was quite challenging. Afterall, this was a major incident that captured nationwide attention.
- There is a relentless nature of the media to get answers from anyone listed as a representative of the municipality or from anyone associated with the involved emergency services.
- Civilian stakeholders are more inclined and willing to provide a statement to the media than law enforcement officials, so it was paramount that the stakeholders in the Berwick community not release any information on behalf of law enforcement that were obviously focused on the task at hand and not the news story. This eliminated any misinformation and further speculation.

ADDITIONAL CHALLENGES

- At 2054hrs the 911 Center dispatched a report of shooting at a residence in the 1100 block of 3rd Avenue. Several uniformed police officers were forced to leave their responsibilities of crime scene protection and respond to the dispatch.
- I should mention that prior to this incident there was an aggravated assault that occurred in Berwick wherein the victim was seriously beaten because he was believed to be the actor that set the fire in Nescopeck.
- On top of that, there was a lot of misinformation at the scene and some speculation that the mass casualty incident was related to the fatal fire, so when the dispatch came in regarding the shooting it was believed that it might also be related.

ADDITIONAL CHALLENGES

- When the dispatch came in about the shooting, the scene was not as chaotic because most of the injured had already been transported, but still there was a large number of witnesses near the scene and even more people that had gathered just outside of the crime scene. It was over thirty (30) minutes until police officers were able to return to the scene, so crime scene preservation became a significant challenge.



DE-BRIEF

- There were numerous ambulances and helicopters being called and recalled. The 911 Center did a fantastic job considering all the radio traffic and they should be commended.
- I personally spoke directly with Alex Karpinski at the 911 Center on my way to the scene and his ability to relay bullet point details in the proper sequence of importance was impressive.
- Trooper Anthony Petroski, was the PIO for this event and he did a fantastic job of juggling all the data, handling the difficulties of the event being multi-jurisdictional and consistently putting out clear and concise information about the event.

Mass casualty incidents are tragic. Any incident that involves the loss of life is heartbreaking. I express my condolences to the families who lost a loved one yesterday and the Berwick Police Department's thoughts and prayers are with them and those who sustained injuries as a result of this incident as well as their families.

As I reflect on the aftermath of yesterday's mass casualty incident, I want to express my gratitude for the outpouring of mutual-aid support that was shown to not only the Berwick Police Department but to the Borough of Berwick community. Amidst the chaos, upon first stepping on scene, there was a sense of comfort after observing such support. It made our job a lot easier for critical incident management.

I would like to thank and recognize my team of Officers and Investigators for controlling and preserving the scene. Also, I thank and recognize the assistance from the Pennsylvania State Police, Police Departments from the following townships and boroughs; Salem, Sugarloaf, Briar Creek, South Centre, Scott, Hemlock, Main, Benton, Catawissa, Danville, Riverside and Bloomsburg University Police and all of the other area agencies who were on standby and offered to assist throughout the evening. We are extremely fortunate to have a strong mutual-aid network in Columbia and lower Luzerne Counties. This event highlighted the need for enhanced vigilance and heightened situational awareness each and every day in order to be best prepared to deal with random acts of violence.

Yesterday's incident demonstrates the dynamic nature of calls first responders can respond to on any given day. We are also very appreciative to the assistance from all the involved fire and EMS first responders that acted courageously and fluidly throughout the duration of the event. Fluidity amongst Police, Fire Department, EMS agencies and Fire Police is paramount for successful conclusion to any event. I personally witnessed several life-saving maneuvers transpire while first responders were triaging injured victims and will never forget those heroic efforts. Many citizens jumped into action to assist the injured in the triage areas. This combined effort of emergency medical personnel, first responders and citizens are the reason there were far less tragic circumstances to endure. Victims and witnesses were patient and cooperative with the difficultness of methodical investigative tactics. Community leaders were out in full force aiding in numerous unseen ways and businesses donated food and water to aid all the first responders at the scene. This was an all hands-on-deck effort and an exemplary example of how emergency services and the community can come together.

DE-BRIEF

- Having a PSP Major Case Team respond is such a phenomenal resource during a critical incident. It tremendously lessens the burden on local law enforcement.
- We are extremely fortunate to have a strong first responder mutual-aid network in Columbia and lower Luzerne Counties. This event highlighted the need for enhanced vigilance and heightened situational awareness in order to be best prepared to deal with random acts of violence that are now becoming common.
- My heart goes out to all the first responders that responded to both the fatal fire in Nescopeck as well as the mass casualty incident at the ID. There were genuine concerns for their overall mental well-being. Therefore, extra attention was given to Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) efforts.

CRITICAL INCIDENT STRESS MANAGEMENT (CISM)

- Specifically, a collaboration between the Berwick United Way, the Community Giving Foundation, Berwick Area School District, CMSU (Single County Authority) and Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit organized a crisis team to provide opportunities for the public to come together to share their experience of trauma and grief and try to make sense of the tragedies.
- The Columbia County District Attorney's Office organized *First Responder Trauma Group Sessions* with Monsignor Thomas Muldowney (PSP Crisis Chaplain) for any dispatchers, law enforcement, fire and EMS personnel who assisted with the tragic incidents in Berwick and Nescopeck.
- The slogan of **BERWICK-NESCOPECK STRONG** was created as a reaction to inspire and carry the community forward after facing such adversity. Undoubtedly, many people from both communities and others rallied behind it!

AFTER-ACTION

- The very next day after the mass casualty incident, a pre-planned funeral procession was held in Nescopeck and Berwick to honor Dale Baker, one of the victims of the residential fire who was a volunteer firefighter. This funeral procession occurred in the late morning, early afternoon hours and it should be known that numerous first responders were involved in the procession as well as the traffic safety detail. These first responders were the same ones that were involved in both major incidents and they were physically and emotionally exhausted. It was one of many examples of solidarity throughout the community. Other examples were community stakeholders creating a temporary task force to ensure that counseling and crisis resources were available, businesses donating useful items, community members creating memorials and assisting with crime scene cleanup efforts, as well as many prayer and spiritual services.

FACING LIFE IN PRISON

- On June 1, 2023, the defendant responsible for the carnage of this mass casualty incident, showed little to no emotion or remorse as he quietly pleaded GUILTY to two (2) first-degree murders and nineteen (19) attempted murders.
- As part of plea agreement, Columbia County Assistant District Attorney Daniel Lynn agreed to withdraw the death penalty, which was the maximum penalty.
- President Judge Gary E. Norton accepted the defendant's guilty pleas and ordered a full background report be prepared prior to sentencing.
- A court-ordered psychiatric exam of the defendant found he was sane at the time of the killings and no mental defect or illness was alleged as part of his pleadings.

PREPAREDNESS

Large-Scale Outdoor Events

THREAT ASSESSMENT

- To prepare against the threat of any targeted attacks, you need to conduct a threat assessment, know how to access your available resources, develop your mutual aid network and have mitigation plans. I am no expert and am not here to lecture anyone about threat assessment. There are numerous resources available online that can be quite helpful. Police and School Officials generally examine the United States Secret Service online publications about threat assessment.

THREAT ASSESSMENT

- A few basic current best practices designed to improve facility security and preparedness are:
- *Perimeter Security* - Placement of signs, fencing, lighting, and landscaping as barriers.
- *Access Control* – limiting someone's ability to enter or leave.
- *Surveillance* – camera systems to record activity, humans to patrol the building or grounds.
- *Hardening Techniques* – improving alarms, doors, windows, locks, etc.

OUTDOOR EVENTS

- After this targeted attack, we immediately began to prepare differently for future special events. During our Safety Committee meetings, we discussed logistics of outdoor events in Berwick Borough.
- We discussed the possibilities of a public events committee consisting of Council, Police, Fire, DPW, and members from the public including non-profit employees.
- We discussed the possibility of creating an Event Security Team with traffic control & flagger training or hiring/contracting Auxiliary Police instead of Fire Police.
- We changed parking regulations along both sides of Market Street during the Christmas Boulevard to provide more safety for emergency response on Market Street.

OUTDOOR EVENTS

- We specifically considered concrete and water filled barriers instead of cones and wooden horses for traffic control during special events.
- We utilized plastic Yodock traffic barriers filled with water for the Run for the Diamonds and the Santa Parade. Both of these outdoor events are long-standing traditions and have numerous spectators. I would have preferred the barriers with the fence panels, but they were much more expensive. They provided the appearance of extra protection, but there was no actual added security. One concern we had was if the weather was colder the water inside them could have frozen making them much harder to move back into storage. Also vehicles could still push them out of the way because they slide quite easily. Moving forward, we decided to stick with the handmade wooden horses.

OUTSIDE EVENTS

- Soon our Safety Committee discussions made its way to become a public meeting topic. During the public meeting the statement “we can’t have a knee-jerk reaction because an incident happened” was made. I was then reminded of how challenging change can be.
- The goal was to adjust how special events are coordinated. Several annual special events require PennDOT permits because they would temporarily shut down state highways. So I proposed that all events, parades, police escorts, etc. be subject to an event permits committee consisting of appropriate Borough administration officials. They would evaluate event permit requests and if deemed appropriate, because extra personnel or resources from the Borough were required, the recommendation was to attempt and recover Borough expenses related to those costs. More than the money aspect, the main reason for extra checks and balances was for logistical purposes. If emergency services were aware of large gatherings ahead of time proper planning can be made.

OUTDOOR EVENTS

- Community Stakeholders are often connected with those holding the special events. Also special events are normally held by non-profit groups that do not have the funding to put on these events and certainly do not have any funding to pay for security of their events.
- An example could be the YMCA food giveaway during COVID times. Hard to criticize an effort to help feed those in need, but traffic was bumper-to-bumper for several blocks on Borough owned streets that were in close proximity of our main traffic arteries. People were belligerent and there was a serious safety concern. Fire Police were created to direct traffic during emergencies. They are also often utilized for traffic control during special events because of their training. They receive a pittance for their work. There was very low Fire Police turnout for these traffic problems and on-duty police officers were forced to solve the issue, thus effecting our priority calls.

OUTDOOR EVENTS

- Involving on-duty police officers to handle traffic control duties that are non-emergent and/or special duty details like parades, races, etc. takes away from the emergency response time for dispatched calls for service, which can be dangerous.
- A final point to make about outdoor events is that large-scale events require worst-case scenario planning, appropriate resources and logistics. Intelligence gathering prior to any event may indicate whether the amount of resources need to increase or decrease in order to maintain a safe environment and to conduct a successful event.
- Law enforcement needs to be best-prepared and flexible so they can accommodate changes in resource demands. Sometimes those outside of law enforcement do not understand that importance.

OUTDOOR EVENTS

- I credit our current Council, because they are currently taking some time to consider the issue, determine whether or not it wishes to move forward in any way with an event permits committee. Noted concerns were events on private property, fees that non-profit groups could not afford and the question of government being too intrusive with private property affairs.
- The conversation is still an active one with our Safety Committee and the hope is that we can continue to progress the conversation and find a suitable scenario to collect better logistical information for special events and furthermore gather that information in a much more timely fashion.

PROGRESS

- What I can close with, is the fact that since last year's mass casualty incident and just last month, the Intoxicology Department had another large-scale event in their parking lot. Although the event setup was similar, there was better logistical preparedness for the event because of last year's tragedy. Once the event was promoted on social media, police were able to better monitor any potential threats or concerns and make appropriate decisions on manpower. Also, the Intoxicology Department provided extra security measures. Large vehicles were used as traffic barriers and were strategically parked blocking access to the through-way in the parking lot. Ultimately there was more thought-process that went into the event and better situational awareness. The event was successful and noting out-of-the-ordinary occurred.

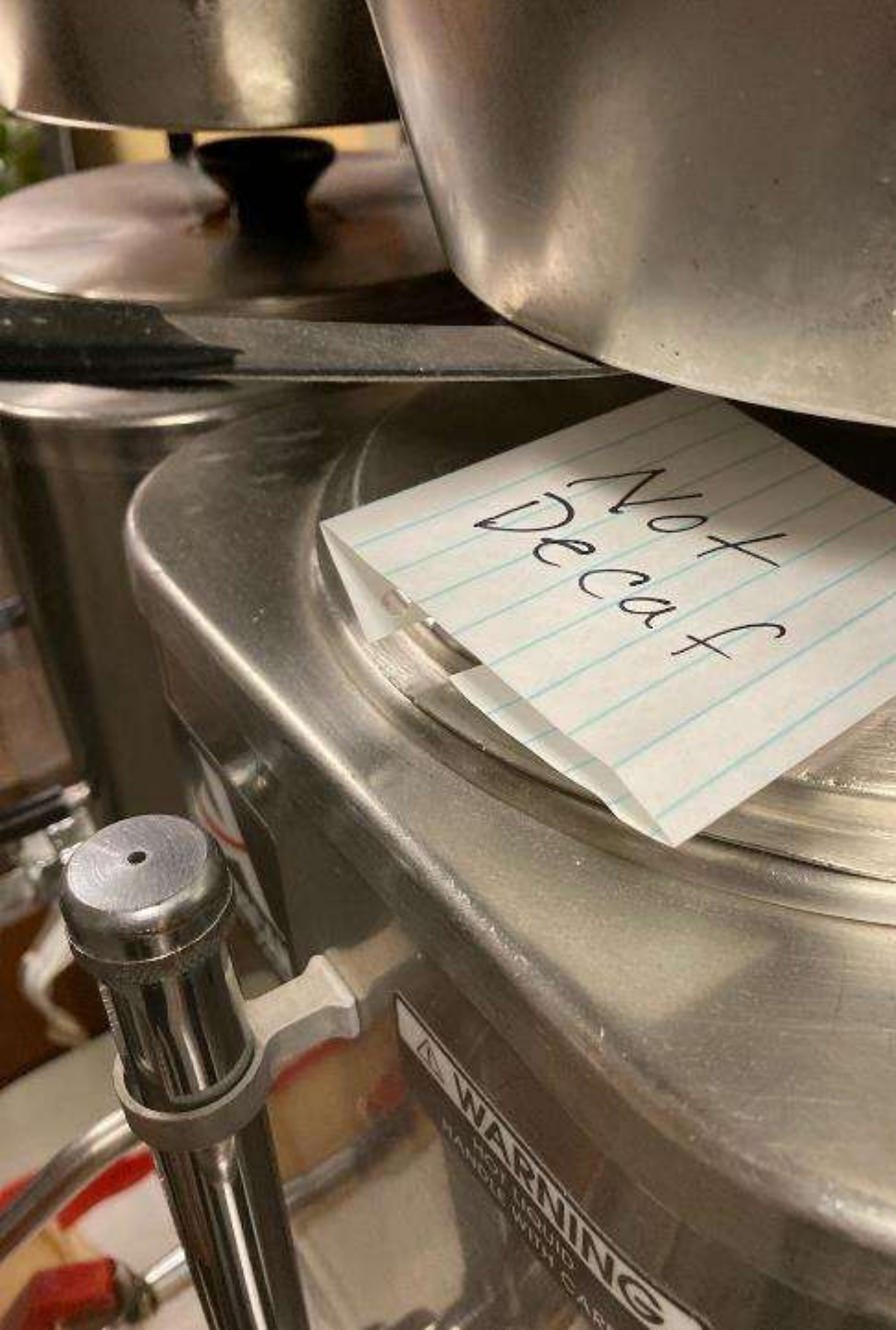
