1. Impacts to research of the OHSU-Legacy integration

Dear colleagues,

The potential OHSU-Legacy integration is big news, as I'm sure you're aware. I see at least two major impacts on research at OHSU if the deal goes through. First, once integration of the two institutions is complete, we will have increased the ratio of clinical revenues to research revenues substantially. At the moment, compared with other academic health centers, that ratio is a little small. Increasing the clinical footprint should eventually stabilize our overall finances, which is good news for stable support of research.

The other major impact is on clinical research. If we do this right and make sure that clinical data for the combined Legacy and OHSU patient populations are readily available for research, we will have a tremendous patient population that cuts across all demographics.

As you've already seen, we have a special research town hall on this topic next Tuesday, Aug. 29 at 4 p.m. (Note that this is in addition to our regularly scheduled town hall on Monday; see below.) To be honest, I suspect I won't have many answers to your questions — we at a very early stage in the process of integration. While a letter of intent has been signed, due diligence and integration planning have yet to take place. That said, it's important for both OHSU and Legacy members to identify challenges and opportunities to integration so they can be factored in. Advocates for research will be at the table to help ensure that the combined entity puts research at the forefront.

It's definitely challenging to sort the wheat from the chaff in our current post-truth world — and this is just as 'true' in science communication as it is in other areas of experience. As NIH notes, "the growing use of preprints and the sheer number of published studies make it increasingly difficult to determine which findings are worthy of attention." NIH Loan Repayment program opens Friday, Sept. 1

The NIH Loan Repayment Program is a set of programs established by Congress and designed to recruit and retain highly qualified health professionals into biomedical or biobehavioral research careers. They repay up to \$50,000 annually of a researcher's qualified educational debt in return for a commitment to engage in NIH mission-relevant research.

Grant Writer's Seminar: Write winning NIH grants, Thursday, Oct. 12, and Friday, Oct. 13

This widely acclaimed seminar comprehensively addresses both practical and conceptual aspects important to the proposal writing process. On the first day, emphasis is given to idea development, identification of the most appropriate granting agency, how to write for reviewers, and tips and strategies of proven value in presenting an applicant's case to reviewers. Day two is a half-day seminar for career development award candidates. It emphasizes the partnering between candidate, mentor and institution that is necessary to make these proposals successful, resulting in protected time for research. The National Institutes of Health's mentored K Awards and NIH's Ruth L. Kirschstein F32 National Research Service Award for individual postdoctoral fellows are used as representative applications. Content includes tips and strategies on getting reference letters, selecting and getting the most from a mentor, how review criteria can be used to inform the writing of a CDA, the kinds of research and training to propose and more.

Participants receive a grant writing manual that is distributed in the session. While targeted towards NIH grants, the principles are appropriate for applicants to other agencies.
