





Yakima Valley Farm Workers Clinic


- Large FQHC with 16 clinics in Oregon and Washington
- 2012
 - Began process of PCPCH and NCQA
 - Primary Care BH Pilot 2 sites
- 2013
 - Primary Care BH expanded to 4 sites
- 2014
 - PCPCH and NCQA achievement
 - Primary Care BH expanded to 8 sites





Traditional system does not support patient needs
























PCBH Workflow



Does it Work?

- Population Impact

Our BHCs Average:

≈1300 Patient <u>visits</u> per year

≈ 800 Unique patients seen per year

 \approx 8-12% of clinic population seen

- Outcomes (PHQ-9, GAD-7, ORS)
 - 81% "Treatment Response" (1 measure/1 visit)
 - 60% "Global Improvement" (2+ measures/ 1 visit)
 - 88% "Sustained Global Improvement"
