Background

Oregon is upheld nationally as a leader in youth sexual health policy and partnerships. Developed in 2009, the Oregon Youth Sexual Health Plan addresses teen pregnancy prevention more holistically – shifting youth sexual health from a risk-focused paradigm to a youth-development model of sexual health and well-being.

Beginning in 2018, the coordinated care organization (CCO) incentive metric for effective contraceptive use was expanded to include adolescents ages 15–17, with a total measure age range of 15–50. The webinar series below was designed to help support CCOs better serve this younger population. The resources here were compiled as follow-up to the webinars.
