#### **Overview**

The SHARE Initiative (Supporting Health for All through Reinvestment) was created through Enrolled Oregon House Bill 4018 (2018) and requires CCOs to invest a portion of profits back into communities to address health inequities and the social determinants of health and equity (SDOH-E). For details, see OHA's <a href="SHARE">SHARE</a> Initiative guidance document. SHARE Initiative guidance is posted to the <a href="SHARE">SHARE</a> Initiative webpage.

In accordance with the requirements stated in ORS 414.572(1)(b)(C) and OAR 410-141-3735, CCOs must designate a portion of annual net income or reserves that exceed the financial requirements for SHARE Initiative spending. According to contract requirements, a CCO's annual SHARE Initiative designation must be spent down within three years<sup>1</sup> of OHA's approval of the same year's SHARE Initiative spending plan; a one-year extension may be requested (four years total).

For contract years 2020 and 2021, CCOs that exceed minimum financial requirements are expected to define their own SHARE Initiative portion in compliance with the statute and rules referenced above.

As described in OHA's SHARE Initiative guidance document, SHARE Initiative spending must meet the following four requirements:

- 1. Spending must fall within SDOH-E domains and include spending toward a statewide housing priority;
- 2. Spending priorities must align with community priorities from community health improvement plans;
- 3. A portion of funds must go to SDOH-E partners; and
- 4. CCOs must designate a role for the community advisory council(s) related to its SHARE Initiative funds.

By December 31<sup>2</sup> of each contract year, the CCO shall submit a SHARE Initiative Spending Plan to OHA for review and approval. The spending plan will identify how the CCO intends to direct its SDOH-E spending based on net income or reserves from the prior year for the SHARE Initiative. This annual SHARE Initiative spending plan will capture from CCOs how they are meeting these contractual requirements.

#### **SHARE Initiative Reporting**

- B. By December 31, each CCO must complete the **Annual SHARE Initiative Spending Plan** described in this document for the *prior year's financials*.

#### Spending plan summary

2. Summarize the work your CCO is funding through this year's SHARE Initiative. At a high level, briefly describe 1) project titles; 2) what activities are being funded; and 3) what populations will be served.

Food For Lane County: Provides \$60,000 for the purpose of supporting the current FOOD for Lane County Produce Plus program which is available to everyone meeting FPL requirements; recent expansion of produce plus to additional sites serving BIPOC and LGBTQIA clients, assisting in promoting a food insecurity screening tool Screen & Intervene.

FUSE Program: The purpose of FUSE is to engage individuals who are experiencing homelessness and are the highest users of crisis services such as the emergency room, jail, emergency transport, and police. By connecting individuals to supportive services and housing, the target population becomes more stable and is less likely to utilize such services. Trillium's contribution provided funding for (1) 20 "super users" who are defined as individuals with complex behavioral health needs who the highest users of emergency rooms, jail, police, courts, clinics, emergency medical transport and crisis systems, and (2) supportive housing placements for five (5) super users.

Eugene YMCA: This project will help fund the construction of the new Lane County YMCA, specifically the Rainbow Preschool Room, which serves pediatric clients.

Carry It Forward: Carry it Forward addresses the community's housing and homelessness problem, seeking solutions at the individual, organizational, and larger systemic levels. Programs are actively informed by the populations they

serve, and approximately 31% of employees are unhoused or have lived experience with homelessness. Carry it Forward provides services to unhoused community members in the Eugene/Springfield area of Lane County. These services include temporary housing (ADA accessible shelter units) with on-site showers, kitchens and laundry facilities. This project provides mobile shower unit, ADA Shelter unit, Kitchen unit, laundry unit; partial coverage for a Personal Health Navigator for Tom Campbell unhoused camp.

Burrito Brigade: This project provides emergency food assistance. This project provides \$15,000 for a year of burrito ingredients, which is 600 burritos every weekend, 31,200 in a year. \$25,000 will be spent on necessities like canned protein, peanut butter and canned soup for the Little Free pantries and Waste to Taste. Waste to Taste free pantry serves 200 households per week.

CORE: In early 2023, CORE plans to open the doors to the Advocacy Center for at-risk young people, a 3,100 square foot, ADA-accessible, multi-zoned, home in downtown Eugene. The Advocacy Center will be a safe space for 16 to 29-year-olds to access free Life Skills workshops, a Community Garden, resume and job support, harm reduction supplies, basic needs, and one-on-one case management. These general operating grant dollars from the Trillium SHARE grant will fund staffing, renovation, transition costs, and furnishing during the move-in period at our Advocacy Center. This investment will allow CORE to develop, launch, and monitor the progress of our new Advocacy Center Life Skills Training programming, including staffing costs to help grow and manage the project while partnering with local experts. The goal is not to recreate and duplicate the type of services already available to young people in Lane County—drop-in centers with showers and laundry and other basic needs, but instead aim to fill a current gap.

Square One Villages: This project funds temporary and permanent Housing solutions. The funding will be applied toward final-stage capital construction costs for Peace Village Co-op which consists of 70 units of high-quality, energy-efficient, permanently affordable co-op housing for people with low incomes (60% or less AMI), through the adaptive reuse of a large, underutilized church property purchased from Peace Presbyterian Church on River Rd. Peace Village will be organized as a homeownership model that combines a limited-equity housing co-op with a community land trust to maintain the land in perpetuity for affordable housing.

Trillium and our Community Advisory Council intentionally prioritized housing basic needs in this year's SHARE allocation. By partnering with Carry it Forward, Square One Villages, and continuing our partnership in the FUSE program, this year's SHARE allocation helps support our local partners in delivering a continuum of housing supports across the communities we serve.
