Juntos utilizes the concept of recovery capital, which includes providing resources that meet a person's basic needs, such as their health, medical care, financial resources, clothing, food, safe and livable housing, and transportation. We believe that when a person does not have to worry about basic needs or their living situation, they have a better chance of recovery. Jose Luis was born in Colima, Colima, Mexico, and has lived in Oregon for over 30 years. José Luis has worked for more than 20 years in behavioral health, providing culturally specific services in the areas of substance use, gang prevention, employment, and housing, with a focus on the Latino/a/x/indigenous and Spanish-speaking communities. Jose Luis has worked for various agencies, including Multnomah County, HomeFoward, El Programa Hispanos, Morrison Center, and DHS. José is also an ethics investigator for MHACBO and the Metro Plus Association of Addiction Peer Professionals (MAAPPS). In 2018, José Luis collaborated with Bridges to Change and Central City Concern's (CCC) Puentes program to open the first culturally specific clean and sober housing program for Latino men in Multnomah County, and in 2020, as the current NW Instituto Latino (NWIL) President, he collaborated with Bridges to Change, 4th Dimension, and CCC Puentes to open the first transitional housing program for Latina women and children who use substances. He also helped NWIL open the first Spanishspeaking Latino Recovery Center in the state.
