Subject: Planned Parenthood claims

The One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA) was enacted on July 4, 2025, as Public Law <u>119-21</u>. Section 71113 prohibits states from using federal Medicaid funds to pay a "prohibited entity" for Medicaid services for a period of one year commencing on the date OBBBA was enacted. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has determined that the Oregon Medicaid enrolled providers that meet the definition of a "prohibited entity" are Planned Parenthood of the Columbia-Willamette (PPCW) and Planned Parenthood of Southwestern Oregon (PPSO).

OHA is directing CCOs to hold Planned Parenthood claims with dates of service on or after July 4, 2025. In the event a CCO pays such a claim and submits the associated encounter data to OHA, OHA will direct the CCO to void the encounter data. OHA is closely monitoring federal guidance and other legal action in this space, all of which is happening quickly, and will provide updates as additional information is known.

This directive only applies to Planned Parenthood claims for services provided to CCO members covered by the 2025 CCO <u>Medicaid</u> Contract. It does <u>not</u> apply to claims for services provided to members covered by the separate Non-Medicaid and Oregon Health Plan Bridge – Basic Health Program Contracts.

What should you do?

Each CCO should:

- Share this communication with relevant staff, providers, and subcontractors.
- Ensure its claims processing system is configured to hold the affected claims. OHA
 does not expect CCOs to submit any accepted liability/paid encounter data
 representing the affected claims until and unless there is future guidance requesting
 the data.
- Reassure all members as necessary that they may continue to access services from Planned Parenthood.
