

On behalf of Liberty House, I write in support of Marion Polk Coordinated Care (MPCC)'s application for the Coordinated Care Organization contract in Marion and Polk counties, and parts of Linn, Benton, Yamhill and Clackamas counties. As the State of Oregon looks to innovate and improve health care in the next five years, we strongly support the network of community stakeholders MPCC has proposed involving in their efforts to address social determinants of health, access to care and health disparities. While MPCC is a newly formed entity, its principals have a long history of serving Oregon Health Plan members as well as a demonstrated commitment to transforming the way care is delivered.

Liberty House's mission includes assessment, counseling and support for children and families referred for concerns of abuse or neglect. Child maltreatment is widely recognized as a public health crisis, generating over \$258 million new aggregated lifetime expenses annually in Marion and Polk Counties alone, according to CDC research that estimates \$215,000 average lifetime aggregated costs for each case of child abuse. We facilitate a gentle, effective, trauma-informed and research-based response to allegations of child maltreatment in Marion and Polk Counties. Liberty House has a long history of strong partnerships with all three partner organizations. Our medical team works very closely with Salem Hospital's Emergency Department staff, consulting on tough child abuse cases. We are partnering with West Valley Hospital to provide child abuse assessment appointments in Dallas in order to better serve rural and isolated children in Polk County. WVP Health Authority has played a leadership and visionary role in supporting Liberty House through acquisition and training on electronic medical records and practice management. The result of these strong collaborations is that our organization has been able to provide medical and forensic interviewing appointments for twice as many children, launch a successful trauma-informed counseling practice, and launch a full-scale Prevention program in the last three years. The strength of these programs reduces the negative outcomes of child maltreatment such as severe injury, death, and youth suicide. Those outcomes contribute to safer and healthier children and families.

Child maltreatment is the most serious public health issue facing the State of Oregon and Marion Polk Coordinated Care is positioned to play a leading role in the effective response. The research involving



the Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) plainly establishes that children with 4 or more ACES are far likelier to develop expensive chronic health conditions such as cancer, heart disease, obesity, diabetes, mental health issues, behavioral problems, suicidal ideation, and to be more likely to become addicted to harmful substances such as drugs, alcohol and tobacco. Child maltreatment can be correlated with higher rates of emergency department visits. Liberty House plays a key role in responding effectively to child maltreatment and facilitating early and appropriate intervention that ultimately reduces long-lasting trauma for the child as well as costs for the health care system as a whole.

Many infants we see at Liberty House do not have a primary care provider. Liberty House plays a critical role in assessing children for abuse and neglect, referring them for primary care follow up and referring the family for early childhood services and therapeutic intervention such as the relief nursery or the Liberty House Hope & Wellness program, which includes TF-DBT, Parent-Child Interaction Therapy, EMDR, and many other modalities. We diagnose, we treat, we heal, and we prevent, and the organizations that have formed MPCC have played strong roles in our effectiveness.

We understand that our organization has been identified as a stakeholder in the Community Engagement Plan and we look forward to forming meaningful partnerships with Marion Polk Coordinated Care as we work together to identify best practices to coordinate care for our most vulnerable populations. Investing in Marion Polk Coordinated Care will be the most effective investment of CCO funding for Marion and Polk Counties and the additional areas proposed to be served.


