Priority populations for Healthier Together Oregon

- Black, Indigenous, people of color, and American Indian/Alaska Native people (BIPOC-AI/AN)
- People with low-income
- People with disabilities
- People living in rural areas of the state

End school related disparities for BIPOC-AI/AN children and youth through teacher training, monitoring of data and follow-up with teachers, administrators and schools.

- Implement ODE's Equity Strategic Plan
- Hiring of district level equity directors
- Implement:
 - American Indian/ Alaskan Native Student Success Plan
 - LGBTQ2SIA+ Student Success Plan
 - African American/Black Student Success Plan



Increase use of mediation and restorative justice in schools to address conflict, bullying and racial harassment.

- Social emotional learning
- Application of the Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child framework
- Use of restorative justice as an alternative to traditional suspension and expulsion techniques
- Trauma informed schools



Ensure all school districts are implementing K-12 comprehensive health education according to law.

Example activity:

• Ensure school districts are in compliance with state standards.



Expand recommended preventive health related screenings and interventions in schools.

- Expand currently offered screenings (blood pressure hearing, vision, dental, height, weight and, posture) to include mental health, social determinants and other chronic medical conditions.
- Consider use of mobile clinics, and opportunities to outreach to homeschooled or out of school students.
- Expand school health service models (e.g. School Nurse Pilot Program, School Based Health Centers, telehealth)



Increase access to dental care that is offered in schools, such as dental sealants and fluoride varnish.

- Utilizing mid-level dental provider.
- Consider use of mobile clinics, and opportunities to outreach to homeschooled or out of school students.



Provide culturally and linguistically responsive, trauma informed, multi-tiered behavioral health services and supports to all children and families.

- Use two generation approaches.
- Screening for mental health conditions in early education system.
- Consider needs of BIPOC- Tribal youth, LGBTQ+ youth, and youth with special health care needs
- Incorporate role of school nurses
- Incorporate special education (IDD) needs with mental health
- Incorporate Community Health Workers into the school community



Policy & Advocacy: 2021 Children's Agenda

- Four Domains:
 - Economic Well-being
 - Health
 - Education
 - Family & Community
- Connecting 115 partners
- 44 concepts, 11 priorities
 - Finalized by the steering committee
- Using data to inform all concepts and elevating overall need within
 - Meetings with legislators
 - Written/oral testimonies
 - 1-pagers
 - Advocacy Alerts

Ensure No Worker is Left Behind: Include ITIN Filers in Oregon's EITC (HB 2819)

- Ensure individuals using an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) to file their taxes can access Oregon's Earned Income Tax Credit, ending the current exclusion.
- Elimination of this inequitable exclusion will boost the take-home pay of families in this vital, yet low-wage workforce, helping them meet basic needs.
 - Improve the educational outcomes and life opportunities for children and increase the flow of dollars to under-compensated, immigrant communities in our state
- Submitted by Causa, Oregon Center for Public Policy

- Passed as part of the omnibus tax expenditure bill
 - Did not match the federal portion of the credit (only state)

Establish Profession of Licensed Dental Therapists (HB 2528)

- Establish the profession of licensed dental therapist in Oregon. Legislation establishes requirements for licensing, exams, supervision, scope, and updates Dental Practices Act to include dental therapists.
- Dental therapists are oral health care professionals that can provide basic dental care like exams, filings, and simple extractions under the supervision of a qualified dentist
 - Address dental care barriers for children and families
- 2017 Oregon Smile Survey Findings
 - Children of color and children facing poverty are suffering from high rates of dental disease
- Healthy Teeth Bright Futures Barriers to Care Listening Sessions
 - appointment scheduling delays
 - scheduling conflicts with school and work
 - long wait times
 - lengthy drive times
- Submitted by NAYA Family Center

Reduce/Eliminate Suspension and Expulsion in Early Childhood (SB 236)

- Preschool has the highest suspension and expulsion rates of any age—disproportionately impacting Black children.
 - Clearly defining suspension and expulsion
 - Collecting data for accountability and improvement
 - Supporting early childhood educators to build the skills that allow all children to thrive, such as anti-bias training and infant-toddler early childhood mental health consultation
 - Ending suspension and expulsion by July 1, 2026
- Oregon Preschool Development Grant found that children who were American Indian/Alaskan Native/Hawaiian Native and those who were multi-racial/multi-ethnic were about three times more likely than white children to be asked to leave care.

Research & Data Overview



• Annie E. Casey Foundation's 2021 KIDS COUNT Data Book

Oregon ranked 25th in US for overall child well-being, based on 16 indicators:

o Economic Well-being: **31st**

Education: 40th

Health: 8th

Family & Community: 19th



Our Children Oregon's KIDS COUNT Data Cards

State & county-level data on **21 indicators**, **disaggregated by race/ethnicity** when available, to inform a more equitable post-pandemic recovery

2021 data cards predominantly based on 2019 data







- KIDS COUNT Indicator Reevaluation
 - Actively reviewing existing KIDS COUNT indicators & considering replacements with timely, pandemic-relevant data points
 - What data best represent the nuances of economic well-being, education, health, family & community for Oregon's children & families in 2021?
- "Oregon's Child Care Conundrum: Hurdles, Disparities, and Opportunities
 Amidst the Pandemic" Issue Brief
 - Upcoming brief on latest findings surrounding the state of child care in Oregon, to be published in December 2021
 - Covering Household Pulse Survey data, child care deserts & subsidies, RAPID-EC provider emotional distress, policy recommendations
 - Long- and short-form briefs, as well as two-page summary, to be released



2022 Legislative Short Session

Formulating the 2022 Children's Agenda

Creation of a holistic legislative agenda lead by the **steering committee**, advocating to decision-makers to prioritize impactful, equitable, and community-driven policies and investments.


