# Vision & Values for the SHIP

#### **Vision**

Oregon will be a place where health and wellbeing are achieved across the lifespan for people of all races, ethnicities, disabilities, genders, sexual orientations, socioeconomic status, nationalities and geographic locations.

#### <u>Values</u>

- Equity and social justice
- Empowerment
- Strengths-based
- Culturally responsive inclusion to achieve authentic community input
- Accountability to action, evidence base and population impact





# **Getting clear on language**

Vision: Oregon will be a place where health and wellbeing are achieved across the lifespan for people of all races, ethnicities, disabilities, genders, sexual orientations, socioeconomic status, nationalities and geographic locations.

**Goal:** Broad statement(s) of what we're trying to accomplish within a given priority area to achieve the vision.

Outcome indicator: Long term measure that would indicate goal is achieved.

**Strategy:** Policy, community and individual level interventions needed to achieve the goal

**Process indicator:** Short term measure that would indicate strategy has been achieved.

Actions: Specific tasks needed to implement strategy



## **Getting clear on language - Example**

Vision: Oregon will be a place where health and wellbeing are achieved across the lifespan for people of all races, ethnicities, disabilities, genders, sexual orientations, socioeconomic status, nationalities and geographic locations.

Goal(s): Eliminate institutional bias in Oregon

**Outcome indicator:** Percentage of people who think about race at least once per day.

**Strategy:** Ensure health care workforce is racially/ethnically representative of Oregon

Process indicator: Health care workforce vs population, by race/ethnicity



# **Examples from other subcommittees**

#### Adversity, trauma and toxic stress

• Increase resilience by promoting safe, connected and strengthsbased individuals, families, caregivers and communities

#### Behavioral health

 Reduce stigma and increase community awareness that behavioral health issues are common and widely experienced.

#### Economic drivers of health

• Improve health by decreasing economic and social inequities.

#### Access to equitable preventive heatlh care

Increase equitable access to and uptake of clinical preventive services



# **Finalizing the goal**

• Elucidate (or develop or champion) a sustainable framework that allows us to work across systems, structures, policies, communities and generations to expose and reduce the impact of institutional bias in income, employment, housing, education and health.

• All people in Oregon feel they are respected and have avenues that are responsive and equitable to address issues and barriers.



# Process for measure identification



# Proposed process for measure development

- Goal: Identify 2-3 key indicators for the priority area
  - Communicate hoped for changes
  - May be long-term in nature (>5 years)
  - Model indicator for CHIPs and other implementers
  - Measure progress towards goal
- Process
  - Identify possible outcome measures from State Health Indicators and other data sources
  - Apply criteria to narrow measures
  - Identify baseline and target



### **Proposed outcome measurement criteria**

Criteria	Definition
Addresses health disparity	Measure health disparity
Community acceptance	Right measure for the issue, measure is easy to understand by all community members
Feasible	Data is already collected, or mechanism for data has been identified

Adults reporting fair or poor health by race/ethnicity (BRFSS)	Х	x	
Residential racial segregation (American Community Survey)	Х	x
