### Where We've Been

#### September 1995

- Tobacco Free Coalition of Benton County began efforts to reduce:
  - 1) youth access to tobacco, and
  - 2) exposure to secondhand smoke through policy change.
- Made first request to the City of Corvallis and Benton County to regulate tobacco sales and secondhand smoke exposure.

#### October 1996

- Joint work session:
  - Corvallis City Council and Benton County Commissioners
- Coalition recommends local government adopt ordinances that:
  - 1)Require vender assisted sales
  - 2)Require tobacco retail license
  - 3)Prohibit smoking in worksites and public places
- Asked to solicit the public and report back

- Coalition worked with staff to:
  - Compile additional research
  - Conduct public forums
  - Survey public opinion
    - February 1997 developed 16 questions
    - mailed to 500 randomly selected registered voters
    - mailed to organizations in the community
    - placed in the local newspaper on 3 occasions
  - Survey restaurants

## **Survey Results**

- 95% ban smoking in all indoor public places
- 87% ban smoking in restaurants
- 56% ban smoking in bars
- 93% vender assistance
- 68% tobacco license
- 85% regulatory approach to restrict access
- Only 1/3 of restaurants allowed smoking

#### **May 1997**

- Presented results at joint work session
- Staff was directed to draft local ordinances implementing the recommendations of the Coalition for concurrent review and action

### **Parallel Ordinances**

- Developed City and County ordinances
  - Staff
  - Coalition members
  - Benton County Counsel
  - Corvallis City Attorney's Office

### **Parallel Ordinances**

#### The proposed ordinances:

- Required a tobacco license.
  - Tack the tobacco license onto the liquor license
  - \$35 liquor license fee an additional \$6 for tobacco
- Required vendor assisted sales.
- Linked license to compliance with other tobacco regulations.
- Protected individuals from secondhand smoke at work sites and enclosed public places.

### **Parallel Ordinances**

- City and County ordinances looked the same
  - Bar and tobacco retail store exemptions
- City planned to remove the bar exemption
- County was still silent on the matter

### **Present Staff Report and Ordinances**

#### **July 1997**

- Another joint meeting:
  - Commissioners and City of Corvallis, Human Services Committee
- Organized community members to comment
- Presented Staff Report and Ordinances
  - Corvallis Chief of Police and Benton County Health Administrator
  - They were worried and confused.

Is there pre-emption or not?

### **Option 1**

1) Adopt all proposed ordinances regulating tobacco sales to minors, licensing of tobacco retailers, and prohibition of smoking in enclosed places open to the public and work sites.

**MOTION**: Commissioners moved to accept option one of the staff report. **3-0** 

**MOTION**: City of Corvallis, Human Services Committee moved to recommend to City Council to adopt the Coalition recommended ordinance with a bar sunset effective in two years. **3-0** 

## **Pass: City of Corvallis**

#### August 1997

#### **Corvallis City Council**

- Added tobacco retail licensing and smokefree workplaces to the Corvallis Municipal Code
- Effective January 1, 1998
  - With the bar exemptions expiring on July 1, 1998

### **Pass: Benton County**

#### September 1997

#### **Benton County Board of Commissioners**

- Tobacco Retail License
  - Effective Oct. 24, 1997
- Smokefree Workplace Law
  - Effective Jan. 1, 1998
  - Exemptions: Bars, bar portions of restaurants, tobacco retail stores

### Where We Are

#### **Benton County**

- Tobacco Retail "Certificate" \$6
- Bars exempt
- Tobacco retail stores exempt

#### **Corvallis**

- Tobacco Retail License \$35
- Tobacco retail stores exempt
- 25% of hotel rooms exempt

### We Have an Access Problem

- Youth still access tobacco
  - —2008-2009, Benton County had a 30.8% non-compliance rate compared to the statewide average of 16.7%.
  - —In Benton County, 13% of 11<sup>th</sup> graders and 5% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders surveyed used cigarettes.
- "Loosies" are being sold
- Tobacco licenses aren't enforced

### **And a Hookah Problem**

- Hookah use is on the rise
  - Especially among 11<sup>th</sup> grade girls in counties with current or former hookah lounges
- HB 2726 didn't do the job
- Several ICAA-exempt scenarios
- Corvallis is a prime location



## And an Emerging Issue

- Electronic cigarettes appeal to youth
  - Sold in convenience stores and mall kiosks
  - Available in candy flavors
  - Unregulated
- AND they pose an enforcement problem
  - Several businesses have asked if they are covered under the State and local laws



#### 1) Strengthen retail licensing requirements

- Require a fee that can maintain administration and enforcement
- Prohibit license issuance to:
  - Mobile retailers
  - Retailers operating at temporary events
- Prohibit retailers from:
  - Violating laws regarding tobacco products or retailing (e.g., State, FDA, MSA, local law)

- Require retailers to:
  - Display license
  - Attend tobacco retailer education
- Require routine compliance checks
  - -2 times per year No sales to minors
  - -1 time per year Other components

#### And depending on political feasibility:

- Prohibit license issuance to retailers:
  - Within pharmacies
  - -Within 1,000 feet of a school
  - Within 500 feet of another tobacco retailer
- Prohibit retailers from:
  - Covering more than 15% of windows/doors with ads/signs
  - Selling flavored tobacco products

- 2) Close the retail tobacco store exemption
- 3) Extend the setback to 25 feet
- 4) Restrict use of e-cigarettes indoors
- 5) Limit the sale of e-cigarettes to adults only
- 6) Prohibit free samples in all places
- 7) General cleaning

# How are we going to do it?

# They already made it a priority

"Whereas, the Board of Commissioners finds that it is necessary and in the public interest to adopt an ordinance regulating the sale of tobacco products in the County in order to reduce youth access to tobacco, reduce addiction to tobacco, and reduce the harmful effects of tobacco on the health of the citizens of the County..."

# And they get a lot of mileage...

...out of the health of our community and the success of the health department.

- Developed pro/con document and one page briefs
- Internal brief with Deputy Director and HP Manager
- Brief and mini strategy session with Health Director

### First Steps

- Update the Board of Commissioners
  - The ICAA has been significantly weakened
  - We are exploring strengthening codes
  - We will return with a package in late summer
- Heads up to other key community members
  - Will you participate when ready?
- Regroup and develop full strategy
