



340B Recertification May 4 – June 1

The 2026 Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), Office of Pharmacy Affairs (OPA) 340B program recertification period for Title X family planning and CDC (STD, TB) grantees is scheduled for May 4 - June 1. The recertification process has not changed from the previous year, and there will be a webinar prior to the recertification start date (webinar date/time is unknown at time of publication).

Prior to being able to recertify, Authorizing Officials (AOs) and Primary Contacts (PCs) must set up a individual user accounts in the 340B Information System (340B OPAIS). Failure to set up user accounts will result in not being able to view accounts or conduct recertification, thus termination from the 340B program.

Please note:

- Covered entities that are registered under 340B under more than one of these programs will have to complete recertification for each of the 340B IDs.
- All active 340B ID's associated with an AO's user account must be updated for recertification to be completed by the established deadline.
- **Failure to recertify by the established deadline will result in termination from the 340B program.**

Oregon 340B Covered Entities and Truzo

If you are an Authorizing Official or Primary Contact for a 340B covered entity, you may have received an email recently from Kalderos instructing you to register for a Truzo account. Truzo is an online platform that some drug manufacturers are using to implement contract pharmacy restrictions to 340B pricing.

As a 340B covered entity located in Oregon, you are exempted from all manufacturer contract pharmacy restriction policies currently being implemented via the Truzo platform and **you are not required to register with Truzo at this time.**

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Oregon 340B Covered Entities and Truzo (continued)

Currently, three drug manufacturers use the Truzo platform: Organon, Puma Biotechnology, and Alkermes. All three of these manufacturers have issued voluntary exemptions to their contract pharmacy restriction policies for covered entities located in Oregon.

These exemptions follow the enactment of HB 2385, a state law that protects 340B in Oregon by prohibiting drug manufacturers from interfering with a pharmacy acquiring, delivering, or dispensing 340B drugs on behalf of a covered entity. The law includes a prohibition on manufacturers requiring claims data as a condition of 340B pricing access.
