<p>Building the Skills to Provide Trauma Informed Care</p>	<p>Laurie Lockert, MS, LPC (she/her/hers) <i>Consultant</i></p> <p>Laurie Lockert MS, LPC has over 35 years of experience in behavioral health. For the last 15 years, she's focused on consulting and training trauma-informed care practices to a diverse range of service systems that specialize in providing care to high risk, complex patients/individuals. She has also provided training and consulting to educators, and others serving children and vulnerable populations. Laurie uses her extensive experience working with complex, high-risk populations to provide organizations with understanding and strategies to help them adapt and improve the care they provide to their clients, and their workforce.</p> <p>Laurie also served on the national advisory panel for Implementation of Trauma-Informed Practices for the Center for Health Care Strategies (CHCS); built the Health Resilience Program an outreach program for high risk patients, that operated on principles of trauma informed care; as well as has provided trainings across a range of social service and healthcare settings.</p>
<p>Identifying and Responding to Human Trafficking as a Healthcare Professional</p>	<p>Nicole Broder, BSN RN, OR-SANE, SANE-A (she/her or they/them) <i>Oregon SANE/SAE Coordinator</i> <i>Oregon Sexual Assault Task Force</i></p> <p>Nicole Broder joined the Sexual Assault Task Force as the Oregon SANE (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) Coordinator in 2016. She began her work with survivors of sexual assault as a crisis advocate from 2006-2010 before attending the University of Portland's Bachelor of Science in Nursing program, which she completed in 2012. While in nursing school, she worked as a domestic violence shelter advocate with the YWCA of Greater Portland and participated on University of Portland's Campus-Community Emergency Response Team. Nicole has worked in respiratory-telemetry, endoscopy, and emergency nursing; and currently practices as a SANE in Oregon and Washington. She has spoken at the local, state, and national level about recognizing human trafficking in the medical setting. She is certified as a SANE for adults and adolescents statewide through the Oregon SANE Certification Commission (OR-SANE) and nationally through the International Association of Forensic Nurses (SANE-A).</p>
