### **Emerging Practices for Supporting LGBTQI+ Young People Across Human Services Programs**

The HHS Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation released a set of resources related to their project Emerging Practices for Supporting LGBTQI+ Youth. This project highlights promising and emerging practices that human services agencies, programs, staff, and leaders are using to make human service delivery and prevention more welcoming and accessible for LGBTQI+ young people (ages 10-24) in child welfare and juvenile justice systems, as well as those experiencing homelessness, and those seeking sexual health services. ### Free Webinar: Trauma Informed Pelvic Care (February 14, 11:00 – 12:30)

The Oregon Reproductive Health Program is excited to partner with Advocates for Youth to provide the Trauma Informed Pelvic Care webinar. This interactive training, designed for healthcare providers, offers historical examples of healthcare-related trauma; reviews current research on the experience of trauma among patients, and describes the importance of trauma-informed pelvic care, especially among adolescents and youth adults. Providers receive step-by-step guidance on how to provide trauma-informed reproductive and sexual health care including appropriate language to use, how to manage patients who have experienced acute trauma, and how to perform pelvic exams using a trauma-informed approach. The training also covers issues related to patient consent to care and provides scripting for providers as they assess potentially activating responses in patients.

Participants will learn why the measure is important and how it can help advance health equity in family planning services.
