Federal Policy

"As an integral part of nutrition education, the State agency shall ensure that local agencies provide drug and other harmful substance abuse information to all pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding women and to parents or caretakers of infants and children participating in the program."

CFR 246.11 (a)(3)

Oregon WIC Policy 880: Referrals

- **NEW** requirement: lead screening & referral
- Four mandatory referrals:
 - 1. Medicaid (OHP)
 - 2. Substance use
 - 3. Immunizations for participants 3-24 months of age
 - 4. Lead screening for children

Oregon WIC Policy 880: Referrals

- Lead referral and substance use education are mandatory starting **January 1, 2026**.
 - Verbal substance use education on the harmful effects of drugs and other harmful substances is required.
 - Blood lead screening referral is required for child participants.

What is the WIC certifier's role?

- 1. Screen participants by asking simple questions to identify those at risk of substance use
- 2. Provide verbal education on the harms of substance use, regardless of how a participant/caregiver screens
- 3. Provide referrals and resources for treatment or community programs for participants needing further evaluation or support
- 4. Maintain confidentiality

What is **NOT** the WIC certifier's role?

- 1. Counseling participants to make changes to their substance use
- 2. Diagnosing a substance use disorder



WIC's role in providing alcohol or other drug information and referrals include: (select all that apply)

- ✓ Offering referrals to alcohol, drug education or tobacco cessation and treatment organizations.



When to offer education

- Substance use education must be provided verbally at least once during each certification period for all women participants and parents/caregivers of infants and children.
- Certifiers shall discuss the potential harmful effects of drugs or other harmful substances, regardless of current use or response to screening questions.

Framing the Screening Questions

- One of the ways WIC supports families is by asking questions about substance use and offering education and referrals that may be helpful for you and your family. I am going to ask you some sensitive questions related to alcohol, tobacco, nicotine and drug use. Please know that your answers will be kept confidential."
- "These next few questions are ones that I am required to ask everyone.
 Asking these questions helps me determine if there are any extra services or other programs you may be interested in receiving a referral to."

How to offer education: acknowledge and affirm

- "I know you shared that you don't use drugs or alcohol. Part of my job here at WIC is to share that there are possible health risks associated with different substances. Are you interested in additional information?"
- "WIC promotes a healthy lifestyle for parents and their families. Substance use can have harmful effects on the whole family. WIC provides substance use prevention information and referrals to increase awareness about the dangers of substance use. Would you be interested in more information?"
- "As a public health nutrition program, we at WIC share with all participants that alcohol, cannabis and other drugs are potentially harmful to you and your baby's health. We have more information and resources available if you have questions."



Affirmations

- "It's great that you are committed to a healthy pregnancy."
- "I know how important it is for you to have a healthy pregnancy. Your decision to avoid substances is crucial to make sure that you do."
- "It sounds like you had trouble in the past and it took a lot of courage to kick that habit. You are on the right path now to be healthier for you and your kids. I am proud of you."

If a participant discloses substance use:

- 1. Maintain participant-centered skills and avoid judgmental statements. Show compassion and care.
- 2. Provide a confidential referral in simple and clear language.

"Thank you for sharing that information with me. Your concern for your baby will help you be a great parent. Would it be okay if I gave you some resources at the end of today's appointment?"

Tips for providing referrals

- Normalize providing the referral
 - "We routinely give referral and resource information in case you or a family member wants more information or support with substance use."
 - "Quitting is hard, but we are here to help. You are not alone. I can provide you with a referral today to talk to someone about quitting."
- Confidentiality
 - "The referral I made today is confidential."
- Familiarize yourself with local resources
 - "I am going to circle some numbers and websites for you, your family, or anyone who you know who might find them helpful or are looking for some support."
 - "I am going to text you a link for you, your family, or anyone you know who might find it helpful or are looking for support."

^{*}Substance use education is required, although does not count as NE for the visit.





Screening for Elevated Blood Lead Levels

- The <u>2024 Nutrition Risk Update</u> in-service has more information about lead, such as background information, testing requirements and providing lead-related nutrition education.
- Lead screening and referral will be required for all children beginning January 1, 2026.
- The lead question on the Health History questionnaire will be required and certifiers must ask this question at each certification and mid-certification.
- If a child has not been screened or tested for their blood lead level, a referral is required. Refer to a health care provider or local public health department.
- When referring, you can use the <u>referral card</u>.






March of Dimes – Beyond Labels: Substance Use Disorder Stigma Stories

Providing Referrals

If substance use is identified during screening, certifiers are <u>required</u> to offer a referral and available local resources:

- 1. Local agency-developed resource/referral guide that include substance abuse counseling and treatment facilities, and smoking/tobacco cessation programs in your community
- 2. <u>Oregon Substance Use Disorders Services Directory</u>
- 3. <u>211info</u>
- 4. <u>Lines for Life</u>: Oregon's home to 988, as well as the Alcohol & Drug Helpline and The Oregon Hopeline.
- 5. <u>Nurture Oregon</u>: Supporting pregnant people who have used substances during their pregnancy by providing integrated care to them, their family, and their baby through one year postpartum. *Serving Benton, Deschutes, Jackson, Lincoln and Umatilla counties.*

Summary

- 1. Screening for substance use and providing verbal education is **required** at least once during the certification period for pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding women, and to parents or caretakers of infants and children on WIC, regardless of screening response.
- 2. Using participant-centered skills such as **framing and affirming** can be helpful when asking sensitive questions and providing education and referrals.
- 3. Providing substance use and lead referrals and resources are **required**, as appropriate. This helps support the health of Oregon WIC families.
