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### ***Youth Sexual Behaviors in Oregon***

#### **Shelagh Johnson**

Shelagh Johnson is currently the Youth Sexual Health Coordinator for the Oregon Health Authority's Public Health Division within the Adolescent and School Health Program. With over 15 years of experience working in adolescent sexual health in both non-profit, health-care, and government settings, Shelagh's current focus is continuing the work of the Oregon Youth Sexual Health Plan by further expanding our concepts of youth sexual health beyond pregnancy prevention. After eight years and numerous schools, Shelagh completed a B.S. at Portland State University in Zoology with a Certificate in Women's Studies, and also proudly has an A.A. degree from Anne Arundel Community College in Maryland. Shelagh was awarded the Willamette Week's Skidmore Prize in 2006, the Joan Helmich Health Educator of the Year Award in 2009, and was a fellow in the Ladder to Leadership Program through the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation in 2010-2011. Currently when she isn't working she is frantically trying to potty-train identical twins and helping her 3<sup>rd</sup> grader adjust to a new school.

Andrea Hoopes, MD, MPH is an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics in the Adolescent Medicine Section and an Investigator in the Adult and Child Consortium of Health Outcomes and Delivery Science (ACCORDS) at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. Dr. Hoopes is a board certified pediatrician and adolescent medicine specialist who cares for patients at Children's Hospital of Colorado. She is also the Medical Director of the Young Mother's Clinic, a multidisciplinary clinic for adolescent mothers and their children. Her research interests focus on improving sexual and reproductive health of adolescents in low-resource communities. She is currently conducting mixed-methods research that aims to better understand the

contraceptive counseling needs of adolescents in order to develop innovative, technology-based solutions to deliver contraceptive counseling and services to young people. She has collaborated with colleagues at the World Health Organization and Centers for Disease Control on policy evaluations of national adolescent contraception policies in South Africa and Paraguay and other initiatives to evaluate adolescent-friendly health services in low- and middle-income countries.
