SBHCs in Oregon: let's start at the very beginning.....

1980's: Dr. Phillip Porter from Cambridge, MA introduced concept of SBHCs

1985: Oregon Legislature and MCHD funded SBHCs

1986: Opened the first SBHCs

1988: Oregon is nationally recognized for SBHCs

1991: State Budget cuts

SBHCs spread out across Oregon



1993: 18 SBHCs in nine counties

- Advocacy Day at the capitol
- Restored funding
- Governor Roberts puts SBHC in legislative guidance
- First Statewide Conference, leading to the concepts of a statewide organization for advocacy and technical assistance





SBHCs Strengthen

1994: RWJ Making the Grade \$2.3 million (6 yrs)

Partial funding of new centers

Program staff at the state

First Standards

Development of data collection and reporting

Funding model is conceptualized

Core SBHC messaging is developed.






2003 to present

- Funding formula is developed
- Oregon is Host for the national convention
- 2007: \$2 million expansion
- 2009: \$1.38 million expansion (new funding formula); Healthy Kids, increasing insurance for kids
- 2010-13 Federal Money: \$7+ million capitol
- 2013-15: HB 2445 and mental health expansion resulted in \$15+ million for SBHCs and State Program Office



In 2014-2015 school year:

- 72% of SBHCs sponsored by FQHCs
- 57% of SBHCs sponsored by LPHAs
 - 38% have FQHC status
- 44% recognized PCPCH



Staffing & Comprehensive Services


- Prevention and early intervention

2013–14 Service Year¹




SBHC Funding

- State funding:
 - To LPHAs via Program Element 44
 - Funding formula:
 - Counties with 1 certified SBHC: \$60,000/year
 - Counties with >1 certified SBHC: \$53,000/year
 - Planning grants
- Billing revenue
- School districts
- Private grants
- Fundraising

Benefits

- Decrease loss of seat time
- Reduce barriers to care
- Care when it is needed
- Parents do not miss work
- Prevention focus
- Improves health and MH
- Connecting to school success
- Care regardless of ability to pay





Effectiveness

Academic Success Enhanced:

attendance, early dismissal, school dropout and grades

Physical and Mental Health:

asthma, obesity, eating disorders, reproductive health, ATOD, depression, anxiety, suicide ideation, bullying, school connectedness


