




#### SERV-OR Volunteers in Action NEW



Mini Modules to Relieve Stress for Healthcare Workers Responding to COVID-19: <u>Creating a Practical Self-Care Plan in Difficult Times</u> (a short video that can help you create a self-care plan to minimize stress and boost resilience; check out the first module on <u>stress management exercises</u>).

CDC TRAIN provides access to courses developed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) programs, grantees, and other funded partners. COVID-19 related courses include information on donning and doffing PPE, contact tracing, ventilator management, stress management and mental health issues, ethical issues, legal issues, long term and alternative care strategies, and many more!


#### We are issuing badges on request!
