#### Shout Out to Direct Relief NEW

As part of the wildfire response, SERV-OR and Oregonians are grateful for the generous donation of Blood Pressure Cuffs, Stethoscopes, and Wildfire Medical Response Kits from Direct Relief - thank you!

Most of these supplies were donated to Medical Reserve Corps Units. Collectively, 7 Wildfire Response Kits, 102 Stethoscopes, and 108 BP kits were distributed for approximately \$6,807.74 in in-kind donations to MRC units! The remaining supplies will be maintained by in the State Managed Volunteer Pool and Health Security, Preparedness and Response program caches for future emergency needs, locally and statewide.

A Personal Experience with the Clackamas County MRC NEW Written by Renee Menkens









MRC members do many things to support their units and their communities. The following is an account of how one volunteer made a difference in the lives of those she served while contributing to the county's COVID-19 investigations.

"I am a school district nurse for Lake Oswego. When schools initially closed in March for COVID-19, I wanted to continue to be involved in the community. As a school nurse, I have worked with the Communicable Disease staff at Clackamas County. So, I contacted them and was able to volunteer as an MRC member. It was great to see Communicable Disease management through a different lens. As a school nurse, I have had to contact them to report communicable diseases, as well as to get information regarding outbreaks and other specific situations. They have always been there for me. Working for them, I learned the depth of their knowledge and compassion, and how quickly they must handle all of the cases they receive daily. My job was to speak to COVID-19 test positive individuals and their close contacts. I have to say-that it was a life-changing experience. At the beginning of the pandemic in Oregon, many times I was the first person whom they spoke to about the disease and how it was affecting them and their families. People lost jobs, lost their health, lost contact with loved ones and were fearful of what their futures held. I became a listener and a witness to the effect of COVID-19 on the people in our community. I am back to school nursing but have a more rounded perspective and astounding appreciation for the Communicable Disease staff at Clackamas County."

We want to thank all our MRC volunteers throughout the state who are doing extra duty supporting their communities during these challenging past several months. A heartfelt and grateful thanks for all you do!

- <u>National Emerging Special Pathogen Training and Education Center (NETEC)</u> COVID-19 webinar series: Tied to ECHO series based on participant questions and evals. Sign up <u>here</u> for e-mail notifications.
  - All webinars are recorded and are available, along with more detailed online training, here
  - o Schedules vary; most live events are Wednesdays or Fridays to avoid conflicts with ECHO
  - CE is offered for live attendance on many webinars and on some recorded content
- APHA/NASEM (National Academies of Science, Engineering, and Medicine) COVID-19 Conversations:
  - The home page has recordings and slide decks from all sessions and e-mail-notification sign-up
  - Current schedule is 1-2 Wednesdays/month, 2:00-3:30 PM PT
  - CE is offered for live attendance
- Environmental Health: <u>National Environmental Health Assn.</u> has a series of <u>COVID-19 just-in-time</u> <u>training videos</u>: free, no registration. Their <u>training calendar</u> lists virtual EH-related training from NEHA and providers across the US (including non-English classes); some are also listed on TRAIN.
